The South Carolina Institute on the Prevention of Sexual Violence on College Campuses is directed to provide an annual comprehensive report of this information to the Commission on Higher Education that will be posted to the commission's website. This information shall be available by June 15 of each year.

In August 2025, Aiken Technical College hosted a Domestic Violence and Sexual Violence Crisis Services presentation in partnership with the Cumbee Center. The presentation provided students, faculty, and staff with information on available crisis services and support resources for domestic and sexual violence, with approximately 25 participants in attendance.

Anderson University

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

Throughout the reporting period, the office conducted a wide range of training and educational outreach initiatives across the university community. Training was provided to 7 athletic trainers, 6 Campus Ministries confidential resources staff members, 16 Health Center confidential resources staff members, 10 Residence Life staff members and Resident Directors, 80 Resident Assistants (RAs), and 65 Alpha Leaders who support and mentor first-year students. Additionally, the office presented to 57 senior-level administrators, including Vice Presidents, Assistant Vice Presidents, Deans, and the University President, during the Internal Planning Group meeting on August 11. Educational outreach also included participation in the All-Faculty Meeting on August 25, which reached more than 200 faculty and staff members, and in the first-year educational program during Welcome Week, which engaged more than 925 incoming students. TIXC staff also participated in the online SCIP course through Lander University to support ongoing professional development and compliance efforts.

September 2025

During the reporting period, the office provided training and educational outreach to a range of campus populations. Outreach efforts included a presentation at the All AU Staff Meeting on September 18, reaching more than 100 staff members; training for approximately 82 returning international graduate students through UHUB programming held September 22–24; and educational programming for dual-enrollment students, reaching more than 400 participants in person and an additional 15 through an online course. In addition, TIXC staff participated in the online SCIP course through Lander University as part of ongoing professional development.

October 2025

During the reporting period, the office continued its educational outreach through programming and training initiatives. The Healthy Communication Series included a session on Boundaries on October 20, attended by 27 students. Of those, 78% reported learning something new, and 87% indicated the program was personally helpful. A second session on Healthy Relationships was held on October 27 and attended by 31

students; 100% of participants reported learning something new, and 100% indicated the program was personally helpful. Training efforts also included UHUB programming for international graduate students, reaching an estimated 94 new and returning students October 21–23 and an additional 67 returning students October 27–29. Additionally, all returning students, both undergraduate and graduate, were required to review and acknowledge a Title IX update video and accompanying PDF before enrolling in Spring 2026 courses. TIXC staff also participated in the online SCIP course through Lander University as part of ongoing professional development.

November 2025

During the reporting period, the office continued its Healthy Communication Series with programs on Communication (34 students; 76% learned something new; 90% found the program personally helpful), Trauma-Informed Friend (22 students; 91% learned something new; 87% found the program personally helpful), and Breaking Up (36 students). Additionally, Protection for All Risk Management Consultant Mike McCall visited campus November 12–14, providing outreach and Title IX resource materials to approximately 400 student-athletes and coaches, and meeting with Title IX staff and Thrive counselors. TIXC staff also participated in the online SCIP course through Lander University, and a new Title IX Deputy Coordinator completed ATIXA training as part of ongoing professional development.

January 2026

During the reporting period, the office facilitated a Healthy Relationships Book Study that met weekly from January through March. Two separate series were offered—one for female students and another for male students—with 12 female and 12 male students participating in the program.

February 2026

During the reporting period, the office continued its Healthy Relationships Book Study and hosted Rom Com or Horror Movie on February 10, which was attended by 46 students. Training and outreach efforts included a return visit from Protection for All Risk Management Trainer Mike McCall, who met with approximately 200 spring student-athletes and provided each with Title IX brochures and contact information for the Title IX Office. The office also conducted its annual Title IX training for 17 staff and faculty

volunteers on February 3, facilitated Title IX training for first-year students through Vector Solutions with 739 completions, and provided Title IX training to approximately 85 international graduate students through UHUB on February 25.

March 2026

During the reporting period, the office continued its Healthy Relationships Book Study and, on March 4, provided Title IX training to approximately 80 international graduate students through UHUB.

April 2026

During the reporting period, the office hosted Protecting Human Dignity: The Fight Against Human Trafficking, a panel discussion attended by 39 students, and a Bystander Intervention Training on April 20. The office also participated in Denim Day on April 22, engaging faculty and staff in awareness and prevention efforts. Additionally, one Title IX staff member completed ATIXA's Title IX Coordinator Foundations: Sex-Based Harassment for Higher Education and earned certification as part of ongoing professional development.

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, the institution implemented several sexual violence awareness and prevention initiatives. Students were offered the “Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention: Training for Students” through Innovative Educators (Student Lingo) as part of the online orientation experience. The training was also strongly encouraged during New Student Orientation and supported through informational tabling. Faculty and adjunct staff participated in refresher sessions during faculty and adjunct meetings, with a focus on Title IX policies and reporting responsibilities. Additionally, Title IX education was incorporated into New Employee Orientation and New Adjunct Orientation, ensuring consistent onboarding training across employee groups.

September 2025

In September 2025, prevention education continued through the “Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention: Training for Students” (Innovative Educators, Student Lingo), and student organization and advisor training resources were promoted through Student Lingo. Title IX training was also integrated into New Employee Orientation sessions, reinforcing institutional policies, reporting procedures, and prevention expectations for all new hires.

October 2025

October 2025 programming included continued access to the student-facing “Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention” online training module, along with broader employee education through the “Harassment Prevention for Employees – Higher Education Edition” (Percipio), which was required for faculty and staff. A campus-wide student email from the Vice President of Student Affairs addressed student sexual harassment awareness. Title IX education remained a core component of New Employee Orientation throughout the month.

November 2025

In November 2025, the institution continued to offer the “Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention: Training for Students” module through Innovative Educators (Student

Lingo). Title IX training remained embedded in New Employee Orientation, ensuring consistent education for incoming employees on reporting obligations, institutional policies, and available support resources.

December 2025

During December 2025, sexual violence prevention efforts continued through the student online training module "Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention" and ongoing Title IX training in New Employee Orientation. These efforts reinforced institutional expectations, reporting pathways, and prevention education for students and employees.

January 2026

In January 2026, the institution continued to provide the "Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention" online training for students through Innovative Educators. New Student Orientation featured informational tabling to raise awareness of campus resources and prevention programs. Title IX education remained integrated into New Employee Orientation sessions for incoming faculty and staff.

February 2026

February 2026 programming included continued delivery of the student online prevention training module and ongoing Title IX education during New Employee Orientation. These efforts supported consistent reinforcement of reporting procedures, prevention education, and campus support resources.

March 2026

In March 2026, the "Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention" training module remained available to students, and additional outreach occurred through Pathways to Healing information tabling at Centralbration, reaching more than 500 campus participants. Title IX training continued to be provided through New Employee Orientation, ensuring ongoing employee education and compliance.

April 2026

April 2026 included Sexual Assault Awareness Month programming, featuring weekly email newsletter content, a training completion raffle, and information tabling to increase campus engagement and awareness. The "Sexual Violence Awareness & Prevention" online training remained available to students throughout the month. Title

IX education also continued through New Employee Orientation sessions for new employees.

Charleston Southern University hosted Because He First Loved, a campus-wide relationship education and awareness initiative designed to promote healthy relationships, positive community engagement, and a culture of respect and belonging.

Rooted in the university's Christian mission, the program encouraged conversations about healthy boundaries, relationship dynamics, and the importance of treating others with dignity, while ensuring all students felt welcome and included.

Programming throughout the week included Rose-grams and the larger Vals and Pals event, where students created bouquets and engaged in meaningful discussions about healthy relationships and interpersonal connections. Approximately 172 students participated in programming throughout the week. An estimated 35 students gave or received Rose-grams, and many also attended the larger Vals and Pals event.

The initiative was a collaborative effort involving Women in Business, the Black Student Union, Counseling Services, Campus Ministries, the Title IX Office, and Student Activities. Following the program, university staff reported approximately 10–15 follow-up conversations and support-related connections with students seeking additional information about healthy boundaries, relationships, and available resources. The initiative successfully increased student engagement around relationship health and fostered proactive conversations about support services and campus resources.

The Citadel

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

During the reporting period, the institution provided multiple sexual harassment and sexual violence (SHSV) education and reporting training sessions to students. Mandatory in-person training was delivered to all incoming freshmen through Knob/Freshman Training and focused on SHSV prevention, awareness, reporting options, and available resources. Mandatory in-person training was also provided during Cadet Leadership Training, emphasizing SHSV education and the roles and responsibilities of student leaders in prevention, intervention, and reporting. In addition, sophomore, junior, and senior students were offered an online SHSV education and reporting training module to reinforce institutional policies, reporting procedures, and support resources.

During the reporting period, SHSV education and reporting presentations were delivered to faculty through multiple forums. A presentation to the Faculty Senate addressed sexual harassment and sexual violence prevention, reporting obligations, institutional procedures, and faculty roles and responsibilities in responding to and reporting concerns. Additionally, a department-specific training was conducted for faculty in the Department of Business, focusing on SHSV education and reporting requirements, supportive measures, and employees' responsibilities in maintaining a safe and equitable learning environment.

During the reporting period, a faculty presentation was delivered to the Department of Psychology on sexual harassment and sexual violence (SHSV) education and reporting, with an emphasis on recognizing and responding to student disclosures, connecting students with available resources and supportive measures, and fostering a safe, supportive, and trauma-informed learning environment.

January 2026

During the reporting period, mandatory SHSV education and prevention training was delivered through multiple student programs. Human Affairs (HA) Training covered sexual harassment and sexual violence prevention, institutional policies, reporting options, bystander intervention, and available support resources. Additionally, a mandatory Knob/Freshman Refresher Training reinforced key SHSV prevention concepts, reporting procedures, campus resources, and students' shared responsibility for maintaining a safe and respectful campus environment.

During the reporting period, all Corps members completed the mandatory online Protection of Minors training module. The training focused on recognizing, preventing, and reporting child sexual abuse material (CSAM) and other forms of child exploitation, while reinforcing individual responsibilities to protect minors and maintain a safe environment for youth.

April 2026

In April 2026, in recognition of Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM), the Title IX Office hosted a SAAM Consent Table and an Interactive Consent Game for the campus community. The program aimed to increase awareness and understanding of consent, healthy relationships, bystander intervention, and available reporting and support resources. Through interactive activities and educational materials, participants were encouraged to engage in conversations about respectful relationships and sexual violence prevention in an approachable, informative setting. The event was open to all members of the campus community, including cadets, students, faculty, and staff, and served as a visible awareness and prevention initiative during Sexual Assault Awareness Month. The program provided participants with information on consent, campus resources, and strategies for fostering a culture of respect and accountability.

Clemson University

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, the institution delivered numerous prevention, education, and awareness initiatives that reached thousands of students, faculty, staff, and community members. Residential Community Mentor (RCM) Training was provided to 220 student and professional staff members and focused on survivor advocacy, support services, and resource connections. Hazing Prevention and Clery Training reached 240 residential life staff members and covered hazing prevention, Clery compliance, and reporting protocols. Trauma-Informed Law Enforcement training was provided to 21 campus police officers across two sessions, emphasizing survivor-centered responses and trauma-informed practices. Additional student leadership training sessions included IFC Orientation, Pi Chi Recruitment Counselor Training (140 participants), Welcome Week Leaders Training (110 participants), and Aspire Facilitator Training (8 participants).

Large-scale outreach efforts engaged students throughout the beginning of the academic year. The PNM Barbeque reached approximately 1,700 students; the Welcome Back Festival engaged 1,000 students; and Tiger Prowl reached more than 7,300 students through campus safety and bystander awareness initiatives. Interactive educational programming included an Occupational and Environmental Safety Self-Defense Class (7 participants), Arcade in the Library featuring Consent Jenga and healthy relationship discussions (100 participants), Mocktail Mixer focused on alcohol and other drug education (200 participants), and Red Zone Awareness Tabling (50 participants).

Peer-led prevention education continued through Aspire to Be Well workshops, which reached 703 students participating in Bridge programs and 6,002 students enrolled in CU1000 courses. These workshops addressed interpersonal violence, mental health, hazing prevention, alcohol and other drug education, bystander intervention, and campus resources. Prevention messaging was further amplified through Healthy Campus social media campaigns focused on Green Screen products and drug-facilitated violence prevention, as well as safe celebration practices and bystander intervention strategies.

September 2025

In September 2025, the institution continued its commitment to preventing interpersonal violence, educating about alcohol and other drugs, and promoting campus safety through a range of educational programs, training sessions, and awareness initiatives. The Huddle Up Gender Violence Prevention Training engaged approximately 300 student-athletes through multiple 90-minute workshops focused on sexual respect, consent, and active bystander intervention. Healthy Campus also hosted an interactive alcohol and other drug education program on September 3, reaching 50 community members and promoting wellness and harm-reduction strategies.

Additional prevention programming included two self-defense courses on September 8 and September 10, which provided interpersonal violence awareness education and self-defense techniques to a total of nine students. On September 14, approximately 200 members of Alpha Chi Omega (AXO) participated in Interpersonal Violence Prevention (IVP) Training that highlighted available resources, support services, and strategies for preventing interpersonal violence. Alcohol and other drug education was further reinforced through Student Judicial Board trainings held on September 16 and 17, reaching 40 student participants, as well as the Impacted Course on September 25, which engaged eight students.

Educational outreach also included an Interpersonal Violence Response (IVR) presentation delivered to a sociology class on September 25. The session, attended by 50 students, was conducted in collaboration with Healthy Campus and provided an overview of support, advocacy, and resource connection services available to survivors of sexual violence, intimate partner violence, and other forms of interpersonal violence. Participants also engaged in interactive scenario-based exercises designed to strengthen their understanding of appropriate responses and resource referrals.

Awareness efforts extended beyond in-person programming through Celebrate Safety social media campaigns on September 5 and September 19, which promoted safe celebration practices and bystander intervention messaging through @clemsonhealthycampus. Additionally, the IVR Healing Book Club brought together 10 students and employees across three sessions to discuss themes related to interpersonal violence in *It Ends With Us* by Colleen Hoover, fostering meaningful conversations about prevention, healthy relationships, and survivor support.

October 2025

During October 2025, the institution continued to expand its interpersonal violence prevention, campus safety, and wellness education efforts through a variety of trainings,

workshops, awareness events, and outreach initiatives. Educational presentations reached students, employees, and community partners across campus and focused on survivor support, healthy relationships, alcohol and other drug education, bystander intervention, and available campus resources.

Interpersonal Violence Response (IVR) staff partnered with Healthy Campus to deliver educational presentations in academic settings, including a sociology class on October 2 that reached 50 students and a Human Health and Diseases class on October 27 that engaged 34 students. These sessions provided an overview of support, advocacy, and resource connection services available to survivors of sexual violence, intimate partner violence, and other forms of interpersonal violence, and incorporated interactive exercises on appropriate responses and resource referrals. Additional prevention-focused programming included a Rep-U class visit on October 29 that reached 50 students and addressed interpersonal violence prevention, healthy relationships, and campus resources. Campus-wide awareness initiatives engaged large numbers of students throughout the month. Alpha Chi Omega's Walk a Mile in Their Shoes event on October 8 promoted healthy relationships and connected approximately 600 students with prevention resources through Interpersonal Violence Prevention (IVP) and Safe Harbor representatives. Additional outreach included the Step Fiercely Forward Walk on October 15 (40 participants), the Alpha Delta Pi Workshop on October 20 (250 participants), a Transfer Student Workshop on October 22 (40 participants), Shoeboxes and Douthitt West residential programming on October 23 (125 participants combined), and specialized training for Residential Community Mentors and COSMIC student leaders that reached 100 student leaders.

Professional development and community education efforts also continued during the month. The Association of Christian Religions Workers (ACRW) training on October 21 provided 23 employees and community partners with information on IVR services, trauma-informed support, and responding appropriately to disclosures of interpersonal violence. Alcohol and other drug education was further reinforced through the Panhellenic Wellness Council presentation, which reached 17 students.

The IVR Healing Book Club continued throughout October, engaging 20 students and employees across two sessions focused on themes of interpersonal violence, prevention, and survivor support, explored through Colleen Hoover's *It Ends With Us*. Prevention messaging was further amplified through Healthy Campus social media campaigns, including Celebrate Safely posts on October 17 and October 31 and a Healthy

Halloween campaign on October 30, which promoted safe decision-making, bystander intervention, and campus safety awareness.

November 2025

In November 2025, the institution continued efforts to promote interpersonal violence prevention, healthy relationships, campus safety, and community awareness through a series of educational programs, training sessions, and outreach initiatives. Students participated in an Interpersonal Violence Prevention (IVP) and Resources Awareness Training on November 5, where 40 participants learned about available campus resources, support services, and strategies to prevent interpersonal violence. Additional student-focused outreach included the East Residential Community Mentor (RCM) and Residents' Workshop on November 4, which provided education on alcohol and overall campus safety, though participation numbers were not available.

Community partnerships remained a key component of prevention and education efforts. On November 6, 45 staff members participated in the Pickens County Community Medic Training, which focused on alcohol and drug safety protocols, risk-reduction strategies, and campus safety practices. The institution also partnered with community stakeholders to provide the Pickens County Advocacy Training on November 12, reaching 12 students, employees, and community members through discussions on interpersonal violence awareness, survivor support, and effective response practices.

Awareness and prevention outreach continued throughout the month through Healthy Campus programming. Step Fiercely Forward Tabling on November 6 engaged approximately 50 students in conversations about healthy relationships, bystander intervention, campus resources, and the upcoming Step Fiercely Forward Walk. The Step Fiercely Forward Walk, held on November 15, brought together an additional 50 participants to raise awareness of interpersonal violence, promote survivor support, and increase visibility of campus and community resources available to those impacted by violence.

January 2026

In January 2026, the institution continued its commitment to prevention education, leadership development, and student wellness through a series of training sessions and workshops focused on interpersonal violence prevention, consent education, healthy relationships, and campus resources. Fraternity and sorority leadership engagement began on January 6 with a training for 44 Fraternity and Sorority Life (FSL) student leaders, covering prevention resources, leadership responsibilities, and strategies to foster safe, supportive campus communities.

The institution also delivered a large-scale Consent and Gender Violence Prevention Workshop on January 6, reaching approximately 500 student-athletes. The program focused on consent, healthy relationships, gender-based violence prevention, and bystander intervention strategies to promote a culture of respect and accountability within athletic programs.

Additional educational outreach included the EES Workshop on January 7, which engaged 12 participants, and the County Advocates Workshop on January 13, which reached eight community members through discussions on prevention, support services, and community-based resources. Student leadership development remained a priority throughout the month, with 20 student staff members completing Aspire Facilitator Training on January 23 in preparation to serve as peer educators and wellness ambassadors. On January 30, an additional 14 students participated in Aspire to Be Well Peer Facilitator training, further strengthening the institution's peer-led prevention and wellness initiatives.

Aspire to Be Well programming continued to serve as a cornerstone of campus prevention education. Throughout January, Aspire facilitators delivered workshops to students enrolled in CU1000 courses, reaching 342 students through interactive sessions focused on interpersonal violence prevention, mental health, alcohol and other drug education, bystander intervention, healthy relationships, and available campus resources.

February 2026

In February 2026, the institution continued efforts to promote healthy relationships, interpersonal violence prevention, and campus resource awareness through educational programs, outreach initiatives, and community engagement activities. On February 5, an Interpersonal Violence Prevention (IVP) and Resources Training was provided to 20 students and community members, increasing awareness of available support services, prevention strategies, and reporting resources.

Healthy Relationships Awareness Month programming included several collaborative outreach efforts across campus. On February 10, the Hot Chocolate and Hot Takes program engaged students in conversations about healthy relationships, prevention, and wellness, though participation numbers were not recorded. The It's On Us Rep-U Training on February 11 reached 25 students and focused on bystander intervention, consent, and strategies for preventing interpersonal violence. Additional awareness efforts included Healthy Relationships Awareness tabling events conducted in partnership with the Office of Advocacy and Success (OAS) on February 12, which engaged 15 students and employees, and with Clemson Undergraduate Student Government (CUSG) on February 13, which reached approximately 100 students. These initiatives provided educational materials, promoted healthy relationship practices, and connected participants with campus resources.

Broader community engagement continued through a Resource Fair held February 18–19, which connected approximately 200 university and community members with campus and local support services. Professional development and safety education efforts also included Citizen Academy Training on February 24, attended by 14 students and employees, which provided information on campus safety, prevention efforts, and available resources.

Prevention messaging was further reinforced through social media outreach, including the Be Kind campaign on February 16 and a Spring Break Bash campaign on February 25. These initiatives promoted healthy decision-making, community care, bystander intervention, and safety awareness among students as they prepared for spring break activities.

March 2026

In March 2026, the institution continued its prevention and awareness efforts through social media campaigns, educational programming, and community engagement initiatives focused on student safety, sexual assault awareness, and resource education. As students prepared for spring break, several digital outreach campaigns were launched, including Spring Break Tips posts on March 4, Celebrate Safely messaging on March 5, and Spring Break Safety Tips posts on March 11–12. These campaigns promoted responsible decision-making, risk-reduction strategies, bystander intervention, and awareness of available support resources.

In recognition of Sexual Assault Awareness Month, multiple educational events were held throughout March. On March 16, Sexual Assault Awareness initiatives engaged

approximately 30 students and 40 community members in discussions on prevention, survivor support, available resources, and community responsibility. An additional Sexual Assault Awareness program on March 18 reached 10 students and continued important conversations about consent, healthy relationships, and interpersonal violence prevention.

Student leadership development and resource education also remained priorities throughout the month. On March 16, 25 Residential Community Mentors (RCMs) participated in training to strengthen their understanding of campus resources, prevention strategies, and their role in supporting students. On March 24, staff participated in the Grow in Success Fair, hosted in partnership with the Library Learning Commons, which engaged 30 students and provided information on campus resources, support services, and student success initiatives.

Awareness efforts concluded with additional digital outreach, including a Celebrate Safely campaign on March 28 and a Yes Fest promotional and educational post on March 30. The Yes Fest campaign generated significant student engagement, with 2,721 views, 11 shares, 31 likes, and 47 total interactions, helping expand the reach of prevention messaging and campus resource awareness across the student community.

April 2025

In April 2026, the institution observed Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) through a range of educational programs, prevention initiatives, awareness campaigns, and community partnerships to promote healthy relationships, consent, bystander intervention, and support for survivors of interpersonal violence. These efforts engaged students, employees, and community members through in-person programming and digital outreach.

The month began with Yes Fest on April 2, connecting 75 students and employees with campus resources and prevention education. On April 8, Alpha Chi Omega hosted the Dance in Their Shoes event, engaging approximately 600 students in conversations about sexual violence prevention, healthy relationships, and survivor support. That same day, a self-defense class provided 16 students and employees with practical techniques while raising awareness of personal safety and interpersonal violence prevention. Digital awareness efforts also expanded through the "You Deserve Respect" campaign, which generated 1,477 views, 54 likes, 12 shares, and 72 interactions, helping to reinforce key messages about respect, consent, and healthy relationships.

Community engagement remained a central focus throughout the month. On April 9, staff participated in a WYFF For the Record interview with SCIP to raise community awareness of prevention efforts and available resources. On April 14, a presentation for 44 students in an Introduction to Social Services course highlighted interpersonal violence prevention, survivor support services, and resource connections. The same day, the Recipe for Love program engaged 90 students in an interactive event focused on healthy relationships, communication, and relationship-building skills.

Professional and community training opportunities also continued throughout April. On April 15, six community members participated in Understanding the Process, a training designed to increase awareness of reporting processes, available resources, and response protocols related to interpersonal violence. Sexual Assault Awareness Month messaging was further amplified through a SAAM Resources social media campaign on April 20, which generated 673 views, eight likes, three shares, and one save. Additional outreach efforts included an Earth Day and Healthy Relationships campaign on April 22 and a Denim Day awareness post on April 23, both of which promoted healthy relationships, prevention education, and survivor support resources.

The month concluded with Denim Day on April 29, during which 21 Division of Student Affairs employees participated in a visible show of support for survivors of sexual violence while helping raise awareness about victim-blaming, consent, and the importance of fostering a culture of respect and accountability.

May 2025

In May 2026, the institution continued its commitment to prevention education and compliance training through targeted outreach to faculty, staff, and student leaders. On May 20, a Title IX training was provided to faculty and staff in the College of Veterinary Medicine, reaching 23 participants in the live session, with additional faculty and staff accessing the training materials online afterward. The training covered Title IX requirements, reporting obligations, available resources, and strategies for supporting students affected by sex-based discrimination, harassment, and violence.

Also on May 20, staff provided training for EUREKA student leaders, engaging four student staff members in education on campus resources, prevention initiatives, and strategies for supporting a safe and inclusive campus environment. These efforts reinforced the institution's ongoing commitment to equipping employees and student leaders with the knowledge and tools needed to support student well-being and promote a culture of safety, respect, and accountability.

Coastal Carolina University

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, the institution delivered several Title IX education and compliance trainings through its Teal Conversations program and other professional development opportunities. These sessions were designed to increase awareness of Title IX requirements, reporting responsibilities, available resources, and strategies for fostering safe and inclusive learning and working environments among key campus stakeholders.

Teal Conversations Title IX training was provided to all NCAA student-athletes, ensuring they received education on sex-based discrimination and harassment, reporting options, consent, healthy relationships, and available support resources. Additional Teal Conversations sessions were conducted for Resident Advisors, targeting student housing employees and reinforcing their responsibilities for reporting concerns, connecting students with resources, and supporting individuals who may disclose experiences of sex-based misconduct.

The institution also offered Teal Conversations Title IX training for participants in the New Chairs Academy and returning academic department chairs. These sessions focused on leadership responsibilities related to Title IX compliance, reporting obligations, supportive measures, and appropriate responses to concerns raised by students and employees. Athletic administration and coaching staff participated in Sun Belt Conference Title IX Training, which addressed compliance requirements and best practices for maintaining equitable athletic environments.

Additional outreach included Teal Conversations Title IX training for Graduate Assistants (GAs) and Teaching Associates (TAs), ensuring graduate student employees understood their reporting responsibilities and available campus resources. The institution also participated in the New Faculty/Staff Expo, providing newly hired faculty and staff with information on Title IX policies, reporting procedures, prevention initiatives, and support services available to members of the campus community.

September 2025

In September 2025, the institution continued its Title IX education, prevention, and awareness efforts through professional development and campus-wide outreach.

Through the Teal Conversations program, Title IX training was provided to faculty and staff in partnership with the Professional Development Office. Designed for all faculty and staff, the training covered Title IX compliance, reporting responsibilities, supportive measures, available resources, and strategies for fostering a safe and inclusive learning and working environment.

As part of its prevention and awareness programming, the institution participated in the Healthy Relationships: Red Zone Fair, engaging faculty, staff, students, and community members in conversations about healthy relationships, consent, bystander intervention, reporting options, and support resources. The event increased awareness of sexual violence prevention and connected attendees with campus and community resources.

Additional outreach was conducted through Teal Conversations Red Zone tabling events, which reached faculty, staff, students, and members of the broader community. These tabling efforts provided educational materials and information about Title IX resources, reporting processes, prevention strategies, and the increased risks associated with the early weeks of the academic year, commonly referred to as the "Red Zone." Together, these initiatives reinforced the institution's commitment to education, prevention, and a campus culture of respect and accountability.

October 2025

In October 2025, the institution continued its commitment to Title IX education, prevention, and awareness through a series of training sessions, educational programs, and community engagement initiatives. Through the Teal Conversations program, Title IX training was provided to faculty and staff in partnership with the Professional Development Office. Designed for all faculty and staff, the training reinforced Title IX compliance requirements, reporting responsibilities, supportive measures, available resources, and strategies for fostering a safe and inclusive campus environment.

The institution also participated in the Light Up the Night 5K Run, engaging faculty, staff, students, and community members to raise awareness of sexual and interpersonal violence and to promote prevention and survivor support. Student-athletes completed Sexual Violence Prevention Training through Vector Solutions, receiving education on consent, healthy relationships, bystander intervention, reporting options, and available campus resources.

Additional Healthy Relationships programming focused on sexual wellness, relationship education, and violence prevention. Educational outreach was provided to members of AAIM through a Sexual Wellness program designed to promote healthy relationships,

communication, consent, and personal well-being. The institution also collaborated on a screening of An Army of Women, engaging students in discussions related to sexual violence awareness, prevention, and advocacy. Further awareness efforts included a Take Back the Night social collaboration that encouraged campus-wide engagement in conversations surrounding survivor support and the prevention of sexual violence.

In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Healthy Relationships programming was offered to residents of Chanticleer and Tradition Residence Halls, providing education on healthy relationships, warning signs of abuse, available resources, and strategies for supporting individuals impacted by domestic violence. The institution also partnered with Alpha Delta Pi (ADPi) to host a Domestic Violence Awareness Month program that promoted education, advocacy, prevention, and awareness of support services available to those affected by interpersonal violence.

December 2025

In December 2025, the institution offered several training and educational programs focused on Title IX awareness, reporting responsibilities, and violence prevention. Through the Teal Conversations program, spring Title IX training was offered to Graduate Assistants, Teaching Associates, and Resident Advisors, reinforcing reporting obligations, resource awareness, and appropriate response procedures. Newly hired faculty and staff also received Title IX education through New Chanticleers Onboarding.

Additional programming was offered through the Healthy Relationships Lecture Series, including sessions on Title IX, Human Trafficking Prevention, Sexual Health and Wellness, Sexual Harassment in the Music Industry, and Stalking and Harassment Prevention. These programs provided students and staff with information on prevention strategies, reporting options, personal safety, healthy relationships, and available support resources.

January 2026

In January 2026, the institution continued its spring semester prevention and awareness efforts through Teal Conversations and Healthy Relationships programming. Title IX training opportunities were offered to Graduate Assistants and Teaching Associates, Resident Advisors, and newly hired employees through New Chanticleers Onboarding,

emphasizing reporting responsibilities, supportive measures, institutional policies, and available campus resources.

The Healthy Relationships Lecture Series continued with educational sessions on Title IX, Human Trafficking Prevention, Sexual Health and Wellness, Sexual Harassment in the Music Industry, and Stalking and Harassment Prevention. These programs promoted awareness of interpersonal violence, healthy relationships, personal safety, and the resources available to students and employees affected by misconduct.

February 2026

In February 2026, the university continued its education and prevention efforts through programming focused on healthy relationships, consent, and sexual violence prevention. As part of the Teal Conversations series, Sexual Assault Prevention presentations were delivered to Political Science courses, providing students with information on consent, recognizing and preventing sexual misconduct, bystander intervention, reporting options, and available support resources. These presentations encouraged meaningful dialogue about creating a safe and respectful campus environment and increased awareness of individual rights and responsibilities under Title IX.

Additionally, the Healthy Relationships Lecture Series featured a Teen Dating Violence Presentation for students. This program focused on recognizing the warning signs of unhealthy and abusive relationships, understanding the dynamics of dating violence, promoting healthy relationship behaviors, and connecting students with campus and community resources for support. Together, these initiatives reinforced the university's commitment to prevention education and awareness and to fostering a culture of respect and safety for all members of the campus community.

March 2026

In March 2026, the university continued its prevention and awareness programming through the Healthy Relationships Lecture Series, which featured a presentation on the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) for students. The program provided information on VAWA's purpose and protections, including issues related to sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking. Participants learned about their rights, available support resources, reporting options, and the importance of fostering a campus culture that promotes safety, respect, and accountability. This educational initiative supported the university's ongoing efforts to increase awareness of interpersonal violence and to empower students with knowledge of prevention and response resources.

April 2026

In April 2026, the university continued its educational and prevention efforts through several student-focused programs that promote healthy relationships and prevent interpersonal violence. As part of the Teal Conversations series, a Panhellenic Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Prevention program was offered to students in the Panhellenic community. The presentation focused on recognizing and preventing sexual assault and domestic violence, understanding reporting options and support resources, and encouraging bystander intervention and accountability within student organizations.

Additionally, the Healthy Relationships program delivered a Building Healthy Relationships presentation for a Sociology course. The program explored the characteristics of healthy and unhealthy relationships, communication skills, boundaries, consent, and relationship safety. The university also hosted Tools and Strategies to Prevent Sexual Assault as part of the Healthy Relationships Lecture Series, providing students with practical prevention strategies, bystander intervention techniques, and information about campus and community resources available to those affected by sexual misconduct. Together, these initiatives supported the university's ongoing commitment to fostering a safe, respectful, and informed campus environment through education, awareness, and prevention programming.

Coker University

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, Coker University implemented a comprehensive series of educational, awareness, and prevention initiatives to promote a safe, respectful campus environment and ensure compliance with federal and institutional requirements. Title IX and Hazing Training was provided to approximately 50 student leaders, focusing on recognizing and responding to prohibited conduct, reporting responsibilities, and fostering a culture of accountability within student organizations. A similar Title IX and Hazing program was delivered to approximately 400 student-athletes, addressing sexual misconduct prevention, hazing awareness, reporting options, bystander intervention, and available support resources.

The university also provided a Title IX, Consent, Healthy Relationships, and Hazing presentation to approximately 300 new students as part of onboarding and orientation. This program introduced students to university policies, the principles of affirmative consent, characteristics of healthy relationships, strategies for preventing interpersonal violence, and avenues for reporting concerns and seeking support.

In addition to student-focused programming, the university conducted several mandatory trainings for faculty and staff. Mandatory Title IX Training was completed by 229 faculty and staff members, providing information on institutional policies, reporting obligations, and appropriate responses to disclosures of sex-based misconduct. Mandatory Hazing Awareness and Prevention Training was also completed by 229 faculty and staff members, reinforcing the university's commitment to preventing hazing and promoting student safety. Finally, Mandatory Campus Security Authority (CSA) Training was completed by 229 faculty and staff members, ensuring employees understood their responsibilities related to crime reporting and campus safety under applicable federal regulations. Collectively, these initiatives reached more than 1,400 participants and demonstrated the university's commitment to education, prevention, and compliance efforts related to sexual misconduct, hazing, and campus safety.

October 2025

In October 2025, Coker University continued its commitment to a safe, respectful campus environment through a series of educational and prevention-focused programs for students. A Title IX Training session was offered to approximately 250 students, covering sex-based discrimination and harassment, reporting options, available support resources, and students' rights and responsibilities under university policy and Title IX. The training emphasized the importance of fostering a campus culture that promotes respect, accountability, and awareness.

In addition, approximately 250 students participated in Healthy Relationships Training, which focused on recognizing the characteristics of healthy and unhealthy relationships, establishing boundaries, communicating effectively, understanding consent, and strategies for maintaining relationship safety. Students also received information about campus and community resources available to individuals affected by interpersonal violence.

The university further strengthened its prevention efforts by providing Bystander Intervention Training to approximately 250 students. This program encouraged students to recognize potentially harmful situations, safely intervene when appropriate, and support peers who may be affected by sexual misconduct, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, or other concerning behaviors. Collectively, these initiatives enhanced student awareness, promoted prevention education, and reinforced the university's commitment to maintaining a safe and supportive learning environment.

In February 2026, Coker University continued its educational and prevention efforts through Healthy Relationships and Consent Programming for residential students. The program engaged 32 participants in discussions on the characteristics of healthy relationships, effective communication, personal boundaries, and the role of affirmative consent in fostering respectful interactions. Participants received information on recognizing unhealthy relationship dynamics, understanding available reporting and support resources, and promoting a culture of respect and accountability within the residential community. April 2026

In April 2026, Coker University observed Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) through educational and prevention-focused programming designed to engage the campus and surrounding community. The university hosted Take Back the Night, an awareness event attended by approximately 75 participants from the campus and local community. The event raised awareness about sexual violence, supported survivors, promoted healing, and encouraged meaningful dialogue about prevention and community responsibility. Through participation and shared reflection, attendees were encouraged to help build a culture that rejects violence and supports those affected by sexual misconduct.

Additionally, the university offered a Green Dot Bystander Intervention Workshop for students, engaging approximately 20 participants. The workshop focused on empowering students to recognize situations that could lead to interpersonal violence and to safely intervene before harm occurs. Participants learned practical bystander intervention strategies, explored ways to support peers, and discussed how individual actions can contribute to a safer campus environment. Together, these initiatives reinforced the university's commitment to sexual violence prevention, survivor support, and the promotion of a respectful and engaged campus community.

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, the College of Charleston's Office of Equal Opportunity Programs conducted its primary annual Residence Life Training for staff, focusing on identifying concerning behavior, reporting obligations, and available campus resources, equipping staff to respond appropriately to disclosures and connect students with support. In addition, the Office of Equal Opportunity Programs hosted a Bystander Intervention Tabling Event in Cougar Mall, providing educational materials and information on campus resources to promote bystander intervention awareness and encourage proactive support within the campus community.

September 2025

In September 2025, the College of Charleston hosted 'All About Sex,' a collaborative event co-hosted by the Wellness Center, OVS, Public Safety Police, and other campus and community organizations, addressing the realities of campus culture nationally. The event featured open discussions, presentations, and interactive workshops on healthy relationships, affirmative consent, sexual health, and bystander intervention strategies. Additional programming during Campus Safety Awareness Month included a watch party for Law & Order SVU: Promising Young Gentlemen, which prompted discussion of rape culture, alcohol use, consent, bystander intervention, and campus resources. Athletic staff and coaches also received training on sexual misconduct prevention and intervention, covering recognition of concerning conduct, reporting responsibilities, support for student-athletes, and appropriate intervention strategies. The Office of the Dean of Students hosted Sexual Wellness Fest programming to increase awareness of bystander intervention, reporting sexual misconduct, and available campus support services. Additional outreach in Cougar Mall included a Bystander Intervention Tabling Event that provided educational materials and resources focused on consent, boundaries, and intervention strategies.

October 2025

In October 2025, the College of Charleston conducted Freshman Student-Athlete Training for incoming student-athletes, focusing on sexual misconduct prevention,

identifying concerning behavior, campus resources, and bystander intervention strategies, with an emphasis on recognizing high-risk behavior and using safe, effective intervention techniques. The Office of Equal Opportunity Programs also hosted a Consent and Boundaries Tabling Event that distributed educational materials on consent and healthy relationship boundaries. In addition, the Boos & Booze Halloween-themed safety event provided students with information on staying safe on and off campus, including drink monitoring, location sharing, identifying unfamiliar individuals, safe costume practices, the amnesty policy, and bystander intervention strategies, along with mocktails and interactive activities. Outreach efforts also included recruitment and informational programming for S.C.O.P.E. and OVS, highlighting S.C.O.P.E.'s mission to reduce risk and raise awareness of sexual violence, interpersonal violence, stalking, and related harms, as well as membership opportunities, expectations, and engagement. The programming also provided an overview of OVS services and resources available to survivors and victims of sexual and interpersonal violence and other serious crimes.

November 2025

In November 2025, College of Charleston institutional leaders participated in Leadership Training on Discrimination Prevention, focusing on recognizing and responding to discriminatory conduct, maintaining professional standards, and fostering an inclusive workplace. The Office of Equal Opportunity Programs also supported Bystander Intervention Awareness during the Homecoming Parade, distributing educational materials on bystander intervention, consent, and boundaries. In addition, the College hosted 'Tuning into the Truth,' an educational program that explored narratives of domestic abuse, sexual assault, and stalking in popular music through guided listening, open discussion, and interactive Kahoot! trivia to reinforce learning and encourage dialogue. Outreach efforts also included recruitment and informational programming for S.C.O.P.E. and OVS, highlighting S.C.O.P.E.'s mission to reduce risk and increase awareness of sexual violence, interpersonal violence, and stalking, as well as membership opportunities and expectations. The programming also provided an overview of OVS services and resources available to survivors and victims of sexual and interpersonal violence and other serious crimes.

In January 2026, the College of Charleston hosted tabling events in Cougar Mall to share resources on bystander intervention and sexual misconduct awareness. The Office of Equal Opportunity Programs also conducted a potential adjudicator training for faculty and staff focused on the sexual misconduct investigation and resolution process. In addition, the Office of Equal Opportunity Programs provided its primary annual Residence Life Training for staff, covering identification of concerning behavior, reporting obligations, and available campus resources, equipping staff to respond appropriately to disclosures and connect students with support.

February 2026

In February 2026, the College of Charleston's Dean of Students Office hosted the 'Do Not Forget Consent' tabling event, which provided consent education and awareness while creating a safe space for students to engage in interactive conversations about boundaries, sexual misconduct, and sexual violence. The Office of the Dean of Students also hosted Sexual Wellness Fest programming focused on bystander intervention, reporting sexual misconduct, and increasing awareness of campus support services. Additional programming included Recruitment Night & Sip and Paint, which recruited new members for S.C.O.P.E. and provided an overview of OVS services, including S.C.O.P.E.'s mission to reduce risk and increase awareness of sexual violence, interpersonal violence, and stalking, as well as membership expectations and engagement opportunities, alongside OVS resources for survivors and victims of violence and serious crimes. The Valentine Candygrams tabling event distributed candy with safety messaging stickers that provided information on OVS and campus resources for survivors of sexual assault, interpersonal violence, stalking, and other serious crimes. The College also hosted 'All About Sex,' a collaborative community event featuring discussions, presentations, and workshops on healthy relationships, affirmative consent, sexual health, and bystander intervention strategies. In addition, S.C.O.P.E. presented 'Self Love 101,' an interactive workshop focused on wellness, confidence-building, and mental health through creative activities such as making wellness baskets and stress balls. The month also included a 'Death in the Dorms' watch party hosted by S.C.O.P.E., which combined true-crime media viewing with discussions on campus safety and interpersonal violence prevention.

August 2025

In August 2025, Erskine College conducted several required education and awareness initiatives focused on Title IX compliance, sexual misconduct prevention, and student safety. A required Title IX training was provided to the football team through an in-person presentation covering sex-based discrimination and harassment, reporting obligations, available support resources, and expectations for maintaining a safe and respectful campus environment. The college also delivered a required Title IX training for all remaining student-athletes, reinforcing institutional policies, prevention strategies, bystander awareness, and reporting options related to sexual misconduct.

In addition, all incoming students participated in an in-person Sexual Assault Awareness Session that introduced concepts of consent, healthy relationships, sexual violence prevention, reporting procedures, and campus support resources. The college further provided Title IX training for Resident Assistants (student leaders) through an in-person session designed to equip student leaders with information on university policies, reporting responsibilities, available resources, and strategies for supporting fellow students. Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

During the August 2025 reporting period, Francis Marion University implemented a wide range of educational, awareness, policy training, and sexual violence prevention initiatives for students, employees, law enforcement personnel, and campus leaders. As part of these efforts, FMU Campus Police hosted the 4th Annual Pee Dee Region Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Conference for Law Enforcement in July 2025. The conference offered regional law enforcement professionals training and collaboration opportunities focused on responding to incidents of sexual assault and domestic violence, supporting survivors, and strengthening community response efforts.

The university also provided Title IX, Sexual Assault Response, and Trauma-Informed Response Training for law enforcement personnel and Student Life staff. The training, facilitated by Charlene Wages, Title IX Coordinator, and Shannon Scott, M.S.N., and Lauren Moose, M.S.N., Forensic Nurse Educators, focused on trauma-informed response practices, survivor support, reporting procedures, and institutional responsibilities related to sexual misconduct investigations and response.

Additional Title IX education and awareness initiatives were provided to a variety of campus populations. Resident Assistants, Housing Staff, and mandatory reporters received training on Title IX requirements, dating violence prevention, reporting obligations, and available campus resources. FMU Campus Police leadership also provided Title IX safety briefings on campus safety and reporting procedures to Occupational Therapy students and staff and to Speech-Language Pathology students and staff.

Targeted outreach was conducted for athletic and student leadership groups. Athletics coaches participated in training on Title IX policies and procedures, mandatory reporting responsibilities, and institutional response protocols. Student-athletes, including members of the soccer and softball teams, received Title IX safety briefings focused on recognizing concerns, accessing resources, and understanding how to report incidents. In addition, student organization members and advisors participated in training covering Title IX requirements, mandatory reporting responsibilities, and reporting

procedures. Collectively, these initiatives reinforced Francis Marion University's commitment to sexual misconduct prevention, reporting awareness, trauma-informed response practices, and a safe and supportive campus environment.

September 2025

In September 2025, Francis Marion University incorporated education on campus safety, sexual misconduct prevention, consent, and Title IX into its University Life (UL) courses, which are graded, for-credit classes taught by FMU faculty. Through these courses, students received information on Title IX protections, reporting procedures, available campus resources, consent, healthy relationships, and personal safety. By embedding this content in the academic curriculum, the university provided students with foundational knowledge of sexual misconduct prevention, reporting options, and their role in fostering a safe and respectful campus community.

In October 2025, Francis Marion University hosted "Profiling Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence," a panel discussion sponsored by the Student Life Office and the Gender Studies Program. The event, open to students, faculty, and staff, drew about 50 attendees. The program featured five panelists representing the Florence Chamber of Commerce, the Pee Dee Coalition, FMU Campus Police, and the South Carolina Institute on the Prevention of Sexual Violence on College Campuses (SCIP).

The panel addressed a range of topics related to sexual assault and domestic violence prevention, including bystander intervention, warning signs of unhealthy relationships, the impact of social media on prevention efforts, fraternity and sorority engagement, campus and community resources, Title IX and Sexual Misconduct policies, the Silent Witness Program, and services available to individuals experiencing interpersonal violence. Representatives from the FMU Testing, Counseling, and Special Services Center were also available to provide information and support resources to attendees. Through this event, approximately 50 members of the campus community received education and awareness programming focused on sexual violence prevention, reporting resources, survivor support, and community engagement.

In March 2026, Francis Marion University highlighted its commitment to improving responses to sexual assault by achieving a Sexual Assault Forensic Excellence (SAFE) Designation for the FMU Police Department. The designation was earned after FMU Police Department personnel completed SAFE training provided by the South Carolina Victim Assistance Network (SCVAN). The training focused on best practices for responding to reports of sexual assault, supporting survivors, preserving evidence, and enhancing trauma-informed law enforcement responses. The SAFE Designation recognizes agencies that have demonstrated a commitment to strengthening their capacity to respond effectively and compassionately to sexual assault cases. This accomplishment reflects the university's ongoing efforts to support survivor-centered practices, improve institutional response protocols, and promote campus safety and sexual violence prevention.

April 2025

In April 2026, Francis Marion University observed Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) through a series of awareness and prevention initiatives supported by a South Carolina Institute on the Prevention of Sexual Violence on College Campuses (SCIP) Grant. The university hosted Denim Design Night, an interactive awareness event inviting students to gather in the University Center Commons for pizza and to participate in a creative activity focused on supporting survivors of sexual assault. Participants decorated personal denim clothing with fabric markers, rhinestones, and

other materials provided through the grant while learning about the significance of Denim Day and its role in raising awareness of sexual violence and supporting survivors.

Five days later, the university hosted a Denim Fashion Show in one of FMU's primary event auditoriums. The event was open to the campus community and featured students modeling the denim creations developed during Denim Design Night. Educational presentations were incorporated throughout the program, addressing topics such as the origins of the "jeans alibi," supporting survivors of sexual assault, available campus and community resources, and the importance of prevention and awareness efforts. Featured speakers included Tracey Miller of the Pee Dee Coalition, Carolyn Bazen of the FMU Testing, Counseling, and Special Services Center, FMU Campus Police Chief Don Tarbell, and Dr. Matthew Hammett of SCIP. Student volunteers served as event staff and models, helping facilitate the program and promote campus engagement. Together, these Sexual Assault Awareness Month initiatives increased awareness of sexual violence, highlighted survivor support resources, and encouraged meaningful campus dialogue regarding prevention, advocacy, and community responsibility.

All students completed a Third Millennium online training module addressing consent, sexual harassment, and sexual assault before arriving on campus. In addition, all students completed the university's "New at FU" online orientation program, which included information on Title IX, consent, reporting options, and available campus resources.

The university also distributed Title IX-related educational materials to students, including the institutional policy electronically, Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) brochures in hard copy, and informational magnets to students residing in campus housing. Incoming students participated in the mandatory "I Said, You Said" orientation program, which focused on sexual consent, incapacitation, healthy decision-making, and bystander awareness. Orientation programming also included interactive skits and facilitated discussions addressing consent, Title IX reporting procedures, and campus support resources.

To reinforce prevention messaging throughout the academic year, the university maintained multiple educational awareness campaigns across campus. Poster campaigns in residence halls, bathrooms, laundry facilities, and student-centered spaces provided information on Title IX rights and reporting options, bystander intervention strategies, signs of incapacitation, healthy and unhealthy relationship behaviors, verbal and nonverbal consent, dating violence awareness, and amnesty protections related to reporting sexual misconduct. Additional outreach was conducted through Title IX-focused social media campaigns designed to increase awareness of reporting options, student rights, available resources, and the services provided by the university's Title IX Office. Collectively, these initiatives ensured that all students received information on consent, reporting processes, prevention strategies, and support resources available through the university.

September 2025

In September 2025, Furman University launched several prevention and awareness initiatives focused on sexual violence and Title IX education. A “Red Zone” social media campaign provided students with information on consent, reporting options, healthy relationships, and the increased risk of sexual assault during the early weeks of the academic year. The university also began a Bystander Intervention Training initiative for Greek organizations, conducted between September and November and ultimately reaching all Greek organization members. In addition, Furman provided a three-hour training program for new Peer Liaisons, covering Title IX policies and procedures, reporting options, supportive measures, and available campus resources. The university also conducted its annual training for individuals serving as Title IX deputies, investigators, hearing board members, and advisors, reinforcing institutional procedures and responsibilities related to Title IX case resolution.

October 2025

In October 2025, Furman University continued its sexual violence prevention and awareness efforts through educational programming, outreach initiatives, and ongoing bystander intervention training for Greek organizations. The university hosted a Sexual Health Fair focused on healthy sexuality, consent, sexual assault awareness, and campus resources. Additional outreach included a Domestic Violence Awareness Month social media campaign, educational posts about the Title IX Office and sexual misconduct climate survey results, and presentations by the Title IX Coordinator to an academic class and the Student Government Association on sexual harassment, reporting procedures, and available support resources.

November 2025

In November 2025, Furman University concluded its Bystander Intervention Training initiative for Greek organizations, which ran from September through November and reached all members of Greek organizations. The university also launched a social media campaign focused on consent education, providing information on affirmative consent, healthy communication, reporting options, and support resources. Additional outreach addressed the warning signs of digital, emotional, physical, sexual, and financial abuse, helping students recognize unhealthy relationship behaviors and raising awareness of available campus and community resources.

January 2026

In January 2026, Furman University continued its Title IX compliance efforts through its annual employee training program, United Educators' "Title IX and You: Protecting Your Campus." The training used instructional videos, knowledge checks, and interactive learning components to educate employees about Title IX requirements, reporting responsibilities, institutional policies, and available support resources. New employees completed this training or a comparable program offered through Get Inclusive as part of their onboarding.

February 2026

In February 2026, Furman University observed Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month through a social media campaign highlighting healthy relationships, dating violence prevention, warning signs of unhealthy behaviors, and available support resources. Student interns also led tabling activities focused on self-love and self-esteem, promoting positive relationship behaviors and personal well-being. The university's annual employee Title IX training program, United Educators' "Title IX and You: Protecting Your Campus," continued during this reporting period.

March 2026

In March 2026, Furman University continued its sexual violence prevention and Title IX education efforts through programming for student-athletes, student leaders, and the broader campus community. The university provided Sexual Violence Prevention programming for athletics to support NCAA compliance requirements, educating student-athletes on consent, healthy relationships, reporting options, bystander intervention, and available support resources.

The university also hosted "Sex in the Dark," a panel discussion that gave students the opportunity to ask questions and engage in conversations about sexual health, healthy relationships, communication, and sexual consent. The event encouraged open dialogue and increased awareness of relationship wellness, personal boundaries, and respectful interactions.

In addition, Furman conducted a three-hour training for new Peer Liaisons, covering Title IX policies and procedures, reporting options, supportive measures, available resources, and strategies for assisting fellow students. Together, these initiatives

supported the university's ongoing commitment to sexual violence prevention, Title IX awareness, and student education on healthy relationships and consent.

April 2026

In April 2026, Furman University observed Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) through a range of educational and awareness initiatives focused on healthy relationships, consent, and sexual violence prevention. The university participated in a Health and Wellbeing Tabling Fair that brought together campus and community partners, including the Title IX Office, Safe Harbor, and the Julie Valentine Center, to provide information on general health and wellness, sexual consent, healthy dating relationships, and available support resources. The event offered students opportunities to engage with prevention educators and service providers while learning about campus and community resources.

Additional outreach included a tabling program that connected alcohol and other drug prevention with sexual violence prevention, facilitated by a student intern through the university's Student Wellbeing Internship Program. The initiative highlighted the relationship among substance use, consent, risk reduction, and bystander awareness. The university also partnered with Fraternity and Sorority Life to host a Safe Summer tabling event led by risk management representatives from the Interfraternity Council (IFC) and Panhellenic Council. The program provided students with information on healthy decision-making, risk reduction, and sexual health, including the distribution of safer sex materials.

In recognition of Sexual Assault Awareness Month, the student organization Promoting Healthy Options through Knowledge and Service (PHOKS) coordinated a campus-wide Denim Day campaign. Students were encouraged to wear denim to raise awareness about sexual violence, support survivors, and promote conversations about prevention and advocacy. Together, these initiatives supported Furman University's ongoing commitment to sexual violence prevention, student education, and the fostering of a culture of respect, awareness, and support.

May 2026

In May 2026, Furman University continued its sexual violence prevention and education efforts by training athletic staff through a United Educators prevention program. The training was provided to athletic department staff and focused on preventing sexual misconduct, recognizing and responding to concerning behaviors, understanding reporting responsibilities, and promoting a safe and respectful environment for student-

athletes. The program reinforced institutional expectations, Title IX-related responsibilities, and best practices for supporting students and addressing sexual harassment, sexual assault, and interpersonal violence. This initiative supported the university's ongoing commitment to prevention education, compliance, and student safety within the athletics community.

Greenville Technical College

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, Greenville Technical College provided training and educational initiatives to promote Title IX compliance, awareness, and employee understanding of institutional responsibilities related to sex-based discrimination and harassment. Title IX for Higher Education Training was conducted for administrators, faculty, and staff, focusing on Title IX requirements, reporting obligations, institutional policies and procedures, available support resources, and strategies for maintaining a safe and respectful educational environment.

The college also integrated Title IX education into its New Faculty Orientation Training, ensuring that newly hired faculty members received information on Title IX policies, employee reporting responsibilities, available campus resources, and procedures for responding appropriately to disclosures of sex-based misconduct. These efforts supported Greenville Technical College's commitment to prevention education, compliance, and a campus culture grounded in safety, respect, and accountability.

September 2025

In September 2025, Greenville Technical College continued to provide Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The training reinforced employee responsibilities related to Title IX compliance, reporting obligations, institutional policies and procedures, and the prevention of sex-based discrimination and harassment. Participants also received information about available resources and reporting processes to support a safe and respectful educational and workplace environment.

October 2025

In October 2025, Greenville Technical College continued its Title IX education and compliance efforts by providing Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The training reinforced institutional policies and procedures, employee reporting responsibilities, and expectations for preventing and responding to sex-based discrimination and harassment within the college community.

The college also distributed its Annual Title IX Campus-Wide Notification to administrators, faculty, staff, and students. The notification provided information on Title IX rights and protections, reporting options, available support resources, and methods for reporting incidents of sex-based discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct. This outreach helped ensure that members of the campus community remained informed about institutional resources, reporting processes, and avenues for obtaining assistance and support.

November 2025

In November 2025, Greenville Technical College continued to provide Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The training emphasized employees' responsibilities for recognizing and responding to sex-based discrimination and harassment, understanding institutional policies and procedures, and maintaining compliance with Title IX requirements. Participants were also reminded of available reporting channels and support resources.

December 2025

In December 2025, Greenville Technical College continued its employee education efforts on Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The program provided instruction on Title IX obligations, reporting expectations, the prevention of sex-based misconduct, and the college's procedures for addressing concerns raised by students and employees.

January 2026

In January 2026, Greenville Technical College continued its Title IX education initiatives through Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. In addition, New Faculty Orientation Training covered Title IX policies, employee reporting responsibilities, available resources, and procedures for responding appropriately to disclosures of sex-based discrimination, harassment, and misconduct. These efforts helped ensure that both current and newly hired employees understood their responsibilities under Title IX.

February 2026

In February 2026, Greenville Technical College continued to provide Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The training reinforced awareness of institutional policies, reporting procedures, employee obligations, and available resources to support a safe and respectful learning and working environment.

March 2026

In March 2026, Greenville Technical College continued its employee-focused compliance and awareness efforts through Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The program covered reporting responsibilities, preventing sex-based discrimination and harassment, institutional response procedures, and employee roles in supporting campus safety and equity.

April 2026

In April 2026, Greenville Technical College continued to provide Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff, reinforcing Title IX requirements, reporting obligations, and institutional procedures. The college also distributed its Annual Title IX Campus-Wide Notification to administrators, faculty, staff, and students, providing information on Title IX rights and protections, reporting methods, available resources, and options for obtaining assistance related to sex-based discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct.

May 2026

In May 2026, Greenville Technical College continued its Title IX compliance and awareness efforts by providing Title IX for Higher Education Training for administrators, faculty, and staff. The training provided ongoing education on employee responsibilities, reporting expectations, institutional policies, and resources available to support the prevention of sex-based discrimination and harassment across the college community.

Horry-Georgetown Technical College

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, Horry-Georgetown Technical College offered several educational and awareness initiatives focused on Title IX, campus safety, and student rights and responsibilities. All new students were directed to complete the college's Online New Student Orientation, which covered Title IX, campus safety, reporting options, and available support resources. The orientation ensured that incoming students received foundational information on preventing sex-based discrimination and harassment and on the resources available to support a safe learning environment.

In addition, the college integrated Title IX education into program-specific orientations for students in the Diagnostic Medical Sonography, Nursing, and Cosmetology programs. These sessions provided information on Title IX protections, reporting procedures, professional expectations, campus resources, and the college's commitment to maintaining an environment free from discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct. Through these initiatives, Horry-Georgetown Technical College reinforced awareness of Title IX requirements and promoted a culture of safety, respect, and accountability among new students.

September 2025

In September 2025, Horry-Georgetown Technical College continued its Title IX education and awareness efforts through campus-wide communication and program-specific training. An email was sent to all students with important information on campus safety and security, student rights and responsibilities, the Annual Security Report (ASR), and Title IX resources and reporting options. In addition, students in the Esthetics program received Title IX education during program orientation, including reporting procedures, available support resources, and the college's commitment to maintaining a safe and respectful learning environment.

October 2025

In October 2025, Horry-Georgetown Technical College participated in the Light Up the Night 5K for Relationship Violence Awareness, held in collaboration with Coastal Carolina University. The event, open to students, employees, and community members,

promoted awareness of relationship violence, prevention strategies, survivor support, and available resources. The college also supported professional development through Title IX Coordinator Training, which enhanced institutional knowledge of Title IX compliance, case management, reporting procedures, and response obligations.

In December 2025, Horry-Georgetown Technical College continued integrating Title IX education into academic program onboarding. Students in the Paramedic program received orientation training on Title IX, including information on student rights and responsibilities, reporting procedures, available support services, and the college's commitment to providing a learning environment free from discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct.

January 2026

In January 2026, Horry-Georgetown Technical College conducted several Title IX education and training initiatives for students and employees. The college's Title IX Coordinator and Investigator completed advanced training on Title IX compliance, investigations, and institutional response procedures. All new students were directed to complete the Online New Student Orientation, which covered Title IX, campus safety, reporting options, and available resources. The college also integrated Title IX education into New Hire Orientation for employees. Additionally, students in the Nursing and Cosmetology programs received orientation sessions covering Title IX protections, student conduct expectations, reporting procedures, and available support services.

In February 2026, Horry-Georgetown Technical College continued its prevention and awareness efforts through campus-wide outreach and educational programming. An email was sent to all students with information on campus safety and security, student rights and responsibilities, the Annual Security Report, and Title IX resources. In recognition of Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, the college hosted a Healthy Relationships Table and Interactive Display for students and employees, offering

information on healthy relationship behaviors, warning signs of abuse, available resources, and strategies to promote relationship safety and respect.

March 2026

In March 2026, Horry-Georgetown Technical College provided targeted Title IX training and policy education for employees with student-facing and leadership responsibilities. A refresher session on Student Conduct, Student Complaints, Student Grievances, and Title IX was held for Student Affairs and Academic Affairs administrative staff. Additional Title IX training was provided for Department Chairs, Assistant Chairs, and the Tutoring Leadership Team, reinforcing institutional policies, reporting responsibilities, and procedures for responding to student concerns and reports of misconduct.

April 2026

In April 2026, Horry-Georgetown Technical College observed Sexual Assault Awareness Month with educational and awareness programs for students and employees. A refresher session on Student Conduct, Student Complaints, Student Grievances, and Title IX was offered to faculty, reinforcing reporting responsibilities and institutional procedures. The college also hosted a Sexual Assault Awareness Month Trivia Event for students, offering an interactive way to raise awareness of sexual violence prevention, consent, reporting options, and available resources. In addition, students in the Paramedic program received Title IX education as part of their program orientation.

May 2026

In May 2026, Horry-Georgetown Technical College continued its Title IX education and professional development efforts through training for employees and students. As part of Professional Development Day, all employees participated in a session on Student Conduct and Title IX scenarios, covering reporting responsibilities, policy application, and appropriate responses to student concerns. Additional Title IX training was provided to Natural and Physical Sciences faculty, reinforcing institutional policies and reporting obligations. Students entering the Nursing program also received Title IX orientation, including reporting procedures, available resources, and student rights and responsibilities.

Lander University

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, Lander University integrated Title IX education into onboarding for new students and student leaders. The Title IX Office participated in the university's Orientation Panel, providing students with information on Title IX protections, reporting options, available resources, and campus support services. In addition, Dr. Matthew Hammett led a Title IX presentation during Residence Life training for 49 Resident Assistants, focusing on reporting responsibilities, available resources, bystander awareness, and strategies for supporting students who may disclose experiences of sex-based misconduct.

September 2025

In September 2025, Lander University launched several prevention and awareness initiatives focused on sexual misconduct, healthy relationships, and bystander intervention. A Stalking and Harassment/Bystander Intervention Training Pop-Up engaged more than 150 students, offering guidance on recognizing concerning behaviors, intervention strategies, reporting options, and available support resources. The university also held its Annual Title IX Training Presentation for student-athletes and Greek organization members, reaching more than 900 participants and covering Title IX rights and responsibilities, reporting procedures, consent, healthy relationships, and bystander intervention.

Additional outreach included Red Zone Awareness, a resource tabling event designed to raise student awareness of the heightened risk of sexual violence during the early weeks of the academic year. The program provided information on bystander intervention, healthy relationships, reporting options, and campus resources, and distributed educational materials and reporting cards featuring QR codes linking students to prevention and support resources.

October 2025

In October 2025, Lander University expanded its prevention and awareness efforts through campus-wide education and targeted outreach. Sexual Violence Prevention Modules were distributed to all students, faculty, and staff, reaching more than 5,000

community members. The modules covered sexual violence prevention, reporting procedures, available resources, and institutional response processes.

The university also hosted the Step Up and Speak Out: Bystander Intervention Pop-Up Series, engaging more than 300 students throughout the month. These interactive events provided practical tools and strategies for recognizing potentially harmful situations, intervening safely, and supporting others. Additional awareness efforts included placing Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Sexual Assault Awareness posters throughout residence halls, reaching approximately 280 residential students with information on prevention, reporting, and available support resources.

November 2025

In November 2025, Lander University hosted its Annual Cookie Crawl, an educational and awareness event that drew more than 400 members of the campus community. The program brought together numerous campus and community partners, including Meg's House, the Victim Advocate of Greenwood, Beyond Abuse, Lander University Police Department (LUPD), Campus SAVE, and the Wellness Center. Participating organizations provided education on sexual violence prevention, bystander intervention, self-defense, post-traumatic stress disorder, survivor support, and available community resources. The event offered students, faculty, and staff opportunities to engage directly with prevention professionals and learn about resources available to individuals affected by interpersonal violence.

In February 2026, Lander University hosted the Love, Respect, and Consent program for students, engaging more than 80 participants in discussions on healthy relationships, consent, respectful communication, and sexual violence prevention. The program provided students with information on recognizing unhealthy relationship behaviors,

understanding consent, accessing campus resources, and supporting a culture of respect and accountability within the university community.

In April 2026, Lander University continued its awareness efforts by distributing Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Sexual Assault Awareness posters throughout residence halls. The campaign reached approximately 280 residential students and provided information on healthy relationships, warning signs of abuse, reporting options, available resources, and support services. The initiative reinforced the university's commitment to Sexual Assault Awareness Month education and to preventing interpersonal violence.

May 2025

In May 2026, Lander University provided Title IX Training to 25 Orientation Leaders in preparation for upcoming student orientation programs. The training covered Title IX definitions, examples of interpersonal violence, reporting procedures, available campus resources, and upstander education strategies. Participants were equipped with the knowledge needed to serve as peer leaders and help promote a safe, respectful, and informed campus environment for incoming students.

Medical University of South Carolina

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

In August 2025, MUSC continued to strengthen its prevention and education efforts through expanded training, policy implementation, and specialized programming focused on sexual violence prevention, intimate partner violence response, and non-discrimination. To broaden prevention education across the institution, MUSC mandated additional Section 1557 training for all employees and students, reinforcing non-discrimination requirements in health programs and activities. The institution also enhanced required student training by incorporating comprehensive hazing prevention education into existing mandatory modules, further promoting a safe and respectful campus environment.

Campus Security Authorities (CSAs) received specialized training to ensure compliance with Clery Act and Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) reporting requirements. Throughout the year, the Office of Federal and State Compliance (OFSC) continued to provide tailored educational sessions for departments, divisions, and colleges while maintaining professional expertise through annual training with the SUNY Student Conduct Institute. These resources were made available to the broader MUSC community, including all students, faculty, and staff with MUSC email access.

MUSC's Enterprise-Wide Intimate Partner Violence and Sexual Assault Committee continued to meet regularly to develop prevention-focused programming, increase community awareness, and promote effective response strategies. Additionally, the National Crime Victims Research and Treatment Center contributed significantly to campus prevention efforts by providing specialized clinical expertise and educational opportunities related to sexual assault and intimate partner violence.

Healthcare providers, including physicians, forensic nurses, social workers, psychologists, and researchers, participated in advanced training to improve clinical responses to patients affected by sexual assault and intimate partner violence. Educational offerings included continuing education modules on intimate partner violence, sexual assault, and maintaining respectful workplace environments. Although designed primarily for healthcare professionals, these resources were also available to students and

administrative employees, expanding the reach of prevention and response education throughout the MUSC community.

In recognition of Intimate Partner Violence Awareness Month, MUSC hosted and co-sponsored a range of educational and awareness initiatives throughout October 2025. Aligned with South Carolina's statewide campaign, "Know What to Say. Know What to Do.," the programming emphasized healthcare responses to intimate partner violence and the importance of community support.

Events included a Purple Pinwheel Display along the Charleston Medical District Greenway, honoring victims of domestic violence and providing educational resources to community members. MUSC also hosted a virtual panel discussion, "A Healthcare Response to IPV," which brought together forensic nurse examiners, social workers, violence-prevention experts, healthcare professionals, and community partners to discuss acute response strategies and best practices.

Additional awareness efforts included the Clothesline Memorial displayed on the MUSC Horseshoe, where garments symbolized lives affected by domestic violence over the previous year. The institution also observed #PurpleThursday, an enterprise-wide awareness campaign encouraging students, faculty, staff, and community members to wear purple in support of survivors and prevention efforts. Together, these programs increased visibility of intimate partner violence issues while promoting education, support, and prevention across the campus community.

During Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April 2026, MUSC demonstrated its ongoing commitment to preventing sexual violence through education, awareness programs, community partnerships, and survivor support initiatives. Recognizing sexual violence as a critical public health issue, Dr. Michael de Arellano officially proclaimed April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month at MUSC. Guided by the national theme, "25 Years Strong: Looking Back, Moving Forward," and South Carolina's emphasis on consent, MUSC collaborated with local organizations to host a series of educational and community-centered events.

Programming began with Wear Teal Day on April 7, when students, faculty, staff, and community members were encouraged to wear teal and display ribbons in solidarity with survivors of sexual violence. On April 17, MUSC partnered with community organizations to host the "What Were You Wearing?" Exhibit and Reception at North Charleston City Hall. The exhibit challenged victim-blaming myths by pairing survivor stories with representations of clothing worn at the time of assault and included a networking reception and a panel discussion featuring guest speakers and advocates.

On April 18, MUSC participated in the City of North Charleston's Sexual Assault Awareness Month Proclamation event at the Keith Summey North Charleston Library. The event featured remarks from local leaders and victim advocacy organizations and offered additional opportunities for attendees to engage with awareness materials and educational materials. Community engagement efforts continued on April 24 with the Tri-County SPEAKS Community Vigil and Resource Fair at Hampton Park Gazebo. Held

In conjunction with National Crime Victims' Rights Week, the event featured educational resources, survivor support services, guest speakers, and a luminary vigil honoring survivors of violence. Sexual Assault Awareness Month programming concluded on April 29 with International Denim Day and a campus outreach event on the MUSC Greenway. In partnership with Tri-County S.P.E.A.K.S., MUSC encouraged participants to wear denim to challenge misconceptions about sexual assault and to provide prevention education, awareness materials, and support resources to students, faculty, staff, and community members.

All staff members participated in annual Title IX training to reinforce institutional policies, reporting obligations, and resources related to sex discrimination and sexual misconduct. In addition, Title IX education continued through New Employee Orientation sessions for newly hired employees.

Title IX training was provided during New Employee Orientation for new faculty and staff. Topics included prevention strategies, reporting responsibilities, institutional policies, and available support resources.

New Employee Orientation Title IX training for newly hired faculty and staff remained ongoing. The training emphasized prevention efforts, reporting requirements, institutional policies, and support services available to members of the campus community.

In recognition of Sexual Assault Awareness Month, the institution hosted several educational and awareness initiatives. A Sexual Assault Awareness Month presentation, offered in partnership with the Victim Advocate and CASA Family Systems, provided information on prevention, survivor support, advocacy, and campus resources. In August 2025, Spartanburg Community College conducted a comprehensive series of Title IX and hazing-prevention training initiatives for students and employees. All Faculty Training included Title IX and hazing-prevention training, while New Adjunct Training provided an overview of Title IX requirements, reporting obligations, and available resources. The college also incorporated a Title IX Overview into New Student Orientation to ensure incoming students were informed of their rights, reporting options, and available support services.

Additional training was provided to Student Organization Advisors and Student Organization Student Leaders, focusing on Title IX compliance, hazing prevention, reporting responsibilities, and student safety. The college also continued Title IX education for students enrolled in College Skills courses and maintained its annual virtual Title IX training program for new and current employees through the Skillsoft platform.

September 2025

In September 2025, Spartanburg Community College continued its prevention and compliance efforts by offering make-up Title IX and Hazing Prevention Training sessions for student leaders and a Title IX presentation for a student organization. These programs reinforced reporting responsibilities, prevention strategies, and available resources for students. The college also continued Title IX instruction in College Skills courses and maintained its annual Skillsoft-based Title IX training program for employees.

August 2025

In August 2025, Spartanburg Methodist College offered several Title IX and civil rights education initiatives for students and employees. Title IX/Civil Rights Education and Policy Training was conducted for 20 Community Assistants, focusing on reporting responsibilities, available resources, and support for students who may disclose concerns about discrimination, harassment, or misconduct. The college also hosted a Faculty Workshop attended by 10 faculty members, reinforcing Title IX policies, reporting obligations, and institutional procedures.

In addition, the college continued its prevention and awareness programming through Vector's "Title IX and Sexual Harassment Prevention for Employees" training for all new employees and Catharsis Productions' "U Got This!" program for incoming first-year students. Title IX education was also incorporated into SMC 101: Personal Responsibility, ensuring that new students received information on consent, reporting options, healthy relationships, and available support resources.

September 2025

In September 2025, Spartanburg Methodist College conducted Title IX Education/Awareness and Bystander Intervention Training for students and employees, engaging 12 participants in discussions on prevention strategies, intervention techniques, reporting options, and available support resources. The college also provided Title IX/Civil Rights Education and Policy Training for 20 athletic coaches, reinforcing reporting obligations, institutional policies, and responsibilities for maintaining a safe and respectful campus environment.

October 2025

In October 2025, Spartanburg Methodist College continued its prevention and awareness efforts through Title IX/Civil Rights Education and Policy Training for students and employees, reaching 36 participants. SOLACE is a student organization that fosters community, inclusion, peer support, and awareness of issues affecting LGBTQ+ individuals. Meetings offered students opportunities to engage in discussions, build supportive networks, and learn about campus and community resources. Average attendance ranged from 10 to 15 students per meeting.

October 2025

Weekly SOLACE Club meetings continued throughout October, with average attendance of 10 to 15 students per meeting. In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the college also hosted a Domestic Violence Awareness tabling event across all four campuses. The event provided students with information on domestic violence prevention, available support services, reporting options, and community partner resources. Approximately 130 students engaged with the awareness activities.

November 2025

Tri-County Technical College continued its weekly SOLACE Club meetings in November, with average attendance of 10 to 15 students per meeting. The college also observed Transgender Day of Remembrance with awareness events at the Pendleton and Oconee campuses. The program provided education on the experiences of transgender individuals, honored victims of anti-transgender violence, and promoted awareness of resources available to LGBTQ+ students. Approximately 25 students participated.

The college also hosted Alcohol and Other Drugs Awareness events at all four campuses. These programs provided information on the effects of alcohol and substance use, available support resources, and the link between alcohol and other drugs and increased vulnerability to sexual violence. With support from a SCIP grant, additional educational materials on sexual violence prevention, reporting options, and available resources were incorporated into the events, helping strengthen student awareness of the intersection between substance use and sexual violence. A total of 299 students participated in these educational and awareness activities.

May 2025

Weekly SOLACE Club meetings continued through the end of the academic year, with an average of 10 to 15 students attending each meeting. The college also implemented the "Be Informed, Be Empowered, Know Your Rights" awareness campaign across all campuses. The initiative highlighted Title IX rights and protections, explained the institution's Title IX process, and increased awareness of available campus and community resources. Updated Title IX informational booklets, purchased through the SCIP Grant, were distributed to participants. These efforts reached approximately 197 students.

Trident Technical College

The University of South Carolina Aiken implemented Vector Solutions: Sexual Assault Prevention for Undergraduates from August 2025 through May 2026. This online training on the Title IX and Clery Act was automatically assigned to all incoming first-year and transfer students. It focused on fostering healthy relationships, recognizing sexual assault and harassment, understanding reporting options, and promoting bystander intervention. Weekly reminders were sent to students until completion, and registration holds were placed on student accounts for non-compliance.

The university also conducted a series of Title IX trainings for key campus constituencies, including Athletics Staff (August 5), Fall Sports student-athletes (August 11), the Division of Student Affairs and student employees (August 12), Spring Sports student-athletes (August 17), and faculty and staff (August 22). These sessions provided participants with a working knowledge of federal and institutional policies related to discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct, reporting responsibilities, and available resources.

September 2025

The university offered a make-up Title IX training session for student-athletes who could not attend the August session. The program reinforced participants' understanding of federal and university policies on discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct, and emphasized reporting obligations and available support resources.

Members of the university's Title IX team also participated in a two-day ATIXA training program. The professional development opportunity enhanced the team's knowledge of Title IX regulations, investigative practices, supportive measures, and institutional compliance responsibilities, strengthening the university's capacity to administer the Title IX process effectively.

In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the Counseling Center partnered with the Cumbee Center for Abused Individuals to host a Domestic Violence Awareness Kickoff Event. The program provided the campus community with educational materials and information on domestic violence, intimate partner violence prevention, and available support services.

USC Aiken conducted Greek 101 training for new members of fraternity and sorority organizations. The program focused on promoting safe, responsible behavior regarding alcohol and other drugs, while also addressing sexual violence prevention, healthy relationships, consent, and strategies to reduce risk within the campus community.

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

The University of South Carolina Beaufort offered the Sex Rules & Bystander Intervention Workshop to incoming first-year and transfer students. The program focused on healthy relationships, consent, bystander intervention strategies, and the prevention of sexual misconduct and interpersonal violence. Participants learned to recognize problematic behaviors, respond safely to concerning situations, and contribute to a campus culture of respect and accountability. A total of 562 students participated in the workshop.

September 2025

The university conducted a Title IX Workshop for First-Year Students as part of University 101 courses. The training introduced students to Title IX rights and protections, reporting options, supportive resources, and university policies addressing discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct. The workshop also emphasized prevention, personal responsibility, and campus community expectations. A total of 341 first-year and transfer students participated.

USCB implemented its annual Title IX Training for Faculty, Staff, and Student Employees. With support from the South Carolina Sexual Violence Prevention Grant, the university expanded programming for its Sand Shark A.C.T. (Awareness, Consent, and Trust) initiative during Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM). Programming was developed in collaboration with community partners, campus departments, and the Office of Civil Rights and Title IX, and focused on sexual assault prevention, consent education, healthy relationships, sexual health awareness, and fostering a campus culture grounded in respect and accountability.

The Office of Civil Rights and Title IX partnered with the Ryan White Program of Beaufort Jasper Hampton Comprehensive Health Services to host two free rapid HIV testing events. In addition to testing, the events featured sexual health education and HIV awareness outreach. A total of 73 students received HIV testing.

The university also partnered with Student Life to host Sex Bingo, an interactive educational program that facilitated discussions on sexual assault, dating and domestic violence, consent, and campus safety. Educational conversations were incorporated into the event between game rounds, and 34 students participated.

To launch the month's activities, the Office of Civil Rights and Title IX hosted the Sand Shark A.C.T. Tabling Kick-Off. Students engaged with educational materials focused on consent and sexual assault prevention, including a consent wheel activity that

encouraged participants to evaluate real-world scenarios involving consent. A total of 94 students participated.

Hopeful Horizons partnered with the university to host *Guess That Stat*, a tabling event that highlighted data on sexual assault and domestic violence and connected students with educational resources and victim advocacy information. Eighteen students participated.

The university also hosted *Donuts with the Dean: Conversations About Consent*, an informal educational outreach event led by the Dean of Students and Title IX Coordinator. Students participated in conversations about consent, healthy relationships, and sexual violence prevention while engaging in interactive activities. The event reached 183 students, making it the most highly attended program during Sexual Assault Awareness Month.

Additional targeted programming included *Real Talk: Guys Edition*, which focused on masculinity, consent, respect, sexual assault awareness, and bystander intervention for male students. No students participated in this session. The university also partnered with Hopeful Horizons to present *Soft Life, Strong Boundaries*, a program for female students that addressed healthy relationships, personal boundaries, consent, respect, and bystander intervention. Eight students participated.

The month concluded with *Take Back the Night*, an annual awareness and survivor-support event hosted by Hopeful Horizons at USCB. The program raised awareness about sexual assault and dating/domestic violence while providing survivors and allies an opportunity to share experiences and demonstrate support for those affected by violence. A total of 61 individuals attended the event.

University of South Carolina- Columbia

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

The University of South Carolina continued its commitment to fostering a campus environment free from discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct, and retaliation through a variety of education and training initiatives led by the Office of Civil Rights & Title IX.

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX provided tailored Support and Report training sessions to increase awareness of university policies, reporting obligations, supportive resources, and strategies for responding to discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct. These sessions reached 295 student-athletes, 76 athletic trainers, 47 law school peer mentors, 352 residence mentors and coordinators, 20 Student Health and Well-Being graduate assistants, and 300 Student Success peer leaders.

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX also provided required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and newly hired employees. These sessions focused on employee responsibilities related to civil rights compliance, reporting obligations, supportive measures, and institutional procedures. A total of 232 employees participated.

Additionally, the Office of Civil Rights & Title IX participated in University 101 Campus Partner Presentations, reaching 21 first-year students, one peer leader, and one instructor with information on university policies, reporting options, and available support resources.

September 2025

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX continued its Support and Report training series, reaching 237 first-year law students and 78 student affairs professionals. The training provided participants with information on recognizing, reporting, and responding to discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct, and promoted awareness of available support resources.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires also continued during the month, reaching 114 employees.

October 2025

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX delivered Support and Report training sessions to 50 undergraduate admissions staff members, 24 Inclusive Excellence Institute ambassadors, and 83 student affairs professionals. The sessions reinforced institutional expectations for civil rights compliance, reporting responsibilities, and available support resources.

The required training for supervisors, human resources professionals, contacts, and new hires covered 85 employees.

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX also participated in University 101 Campus Partner Presentations, providing education on civil rights protections, reporting procedures, and support resources to 118 first-year students, six peer leaders, and five instructors.

November 2025

Support and Report training sessions continued throughout November, reaching 92 physical therapy students, 27 undergraduate admissions staff members, 13 Introduction to Biomedicine students, and eight peer advocate liaisons from the School of Medicine.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals, contacts, and new hires reached 49 employees.

University 101 Campus Partner Presentations were also held during the month, reaching 159 first-year students, eight peer leaders, and seven instructors.

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX continued its required training for supervisors, human resources professionals, contacts, and newly hired employees. A total of 129 employees completed training on civil rights compliance, reporting obligations, and institutional response procedures.

January 2026

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX provided Support and Report training to 88 Student Success Center peer leaders and 98 second-year School of Medicine students. The training covered civil rights protections, reporting options, supportive resources, and strategies for responding to discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires reached 73 employees.

Support and Report training was delivered to 101 first-year School of Medicine students. Participants received information on university policies, reporting obligations, supportive measures, and resources available to individuals affected by discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires reached 44 employees.

March 2025

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX continued its Support and Report training efforts, reaching nine Education Abroad staff members and 99 members of Kappa Alpha Theta. The training covered recognizing and responding to discrimination, harassment, and sexual misconduct, as well as available reporting options and support services.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires reached 48 employees.

April 2025

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires continued in April, reaching 123 employees.

The university also implemented Vector Solutions' Building Supportive Communities: Title IX and Clery training for employees. The online program covered Title IX and Clery Act requirements, reporting obligations, prevention strategies, and institutional resources related to discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct, and campus safety. A total of 3,471 university employees completed the training.

May 2025

The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX provided Support and Report training to 14 National Science Foundation Undergraduate Research Experiences mentors, 11 student participants in the program, and 32 housing student employees.

Required training for supervisors, human resources professionals and contacts, and new hires continued throughout the month, reaching 74 employees.

The university also continued implementing Vector Solutions' Building Supportive Communities: Title IX and Clery training, reaching an additional 2,882 university employees.

University of South Carolina- Upstate

Education and awareness programs, policy training initiatives, and prevention programs for the 2025-2026 academic year.

August 2025

The University of South Carolina Upstate began the academic year with a series of targeted educational and skill-building programs focused on sexual violence prevention, reporting responsibilities, and campus resources. Residence Assistants participated in training on sexual assault, dating and domestic violence, stalking, harassment, and available support resources. The program included pre- and post-assessments to identify areas for additional education and to inform future training efforts. A total of 30 Residence Assistants participated.

The university also provided Title IX training for Green Team student leaders, reaching 10 students and strengthening their understanding of discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct, reporting obligations, and available support resources.

In addition, Athletics Team Trainings on Discrimination, Harassment, and Sexual Misconduct were conducted for 10 athletic teams. These skill-building sessions focused on prevention, reporting options, bystander intervention, and fostering a respectful team culture. A total of 203 student-athletes participated.

September 2025

USC Upstate continued its outreach to student-athletes through Athletics Team Trainings on Discrimination, Harassment, and Sexual Misconduct. The sessions emphasized prevention, reporting responsibilities, support resources, and strategies for responding to concerning behavior. Six athletic teams participated, reaching 72 student-athletes.

The university also hosted Cupcakes & Conversations, an interactive, discussion-based program focused on consent, healthy relationships, and communication. Fifteen students participated in the skill-building event.

To further promote awareness, USC Upstate hosted a Consent Carnival that combined educational activities with resource-sharing opportunities on consent, healthy relationships, and sexual violence prevention. The event engaged 135 students.

October 2025

The university implemented Bringing in the Bystander training for University 101 classes. This evidence-informed program focused on bystander intervention skills, helping students recognize potentially harmful situations and safely intervene to prevent violence and misconduct. A total of 405 students participated.

USC Upstate also held LinkUP tabling during Hispanic Heritage Month, providing information on available resources and support services while engaging 15 students.

Additional awareness efforts included Halloween-themed tabling focused on sexual misconduct prevention, consent, and available campus resources. Approximately 140 students participated.

November 2025

USC Upstate hosted a Build-A-Boo activity to help students identify characteristics of healthy and unhealthy relationships. Through interactive exercises and discussion, participants explored relationship dynamics, communication, and personal boundaries. A total of 18 students participated.

The university also provided training for Athletics Department staff on responding to reports of harassment, discrimination, and sexual misconduct. The session reviewed available resources, response protocols, athlete support strategies, and policies governing minors' participation in university programs. A total of 48 Athletics Department staff members attended.

To raise awareness of stalking behaviors and prevention strategies, USC Upstate hosted a Stalking Trivia program that engaged students in discussions about warning signs, reporting options, and available resources. Eighteen students participated.

The university also conducted outreach through tabling at Premiere Fair, providing students with information about campus resources, reporting options, and support services. The event reached 25 students.

February 2026

USC Upstate continued its prevention programming through Bringing in the Bystander for Athletes, a specialized bystander intervention program for student-athletes. The training focused on recognizing problematic behaviors, promoting accountability, and developing intervention skills. Twenty-nine student-athletes participated.

Additional awareness efforts included Winter Consent tabling, which provided educational materials and information on consent and healthy relationships to 20 students.

The university also hosted PreTty KomplicAteD, a program focused on healthy relationships, communication, personal boundaries, and recognizing unhealthy relationship behaviors. Twenty-seven students participated.

Break the Cycle programming further addressed relationship violence prevention and healthy relationship development, reaching 38 students through interactive educational activities and discussions.

March 2026

USC Upstate hosted Back in My Body, a skill-building program focused on personal well-being, self-awareness, and trauma recovery. Nine students participated.

The university also participated in Feria de las Flores through resource tabling and outreach, reaching 15 students.

Consent education efforts continued with a dedicated consent-awareness tabling event that provided information on consent, reporting options, and available support resources. The event reached 46 students.

In addition to student programming, USC Upstate completed mandatory employee education through Vector Solutions: Building Supportive Communities – Taking Action. This training addressed discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct prevention, reporting responsibilities, and institutional response procedures. A total of 842 employees completed the training.

April 2026

As part of Sexual Assault Awareness Month and ongoing prevention efforts, USC Upstate hosted In Her Shoes, an experiential learning program designed to deepen understanding of the challenges faced by individuals experiencing relationship violence. Six students participated in the skill-building activity.

The university also conducted a Sexual Assault Awareness Month service project that engaged students in developing awareness materials and educational resources for sexual violence prevention. Thirty-one students participated.

A Victim Resource Fair connected students with information about campus and community support services available to individuals affected by sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, and related concerns. The event reached 40 students.

USC Upstate continued healthy relationship programming through PreTty KomplicAted Part 2, which expanded on previous discussions of boundaries, communication, and relationship health. Twenty-seven students participated.

The Dean of Students and Civil Rights/Title IX Coordinator also hosted a question-and-answer session with Residence Assistants to discuss reporting obligations, available resources, and emerging student concerns. The session served as both a skill-building opportunity and a mechanism for identifying future training needs, and it reached 12 student leaders.

In addition to educational programming, the university revised its Policy on Discrimination, Harassment, and Sexual Misconduct. Revisions included updates to continuing student education requirements and modifications to the definition of non-consensual sexual contact to align with National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) terminology and standards.

September 2025

Voorhees University conducted Title IX training for faculty and staff from September 15 to October 30. The training covered institutional responsibilities related to discrimination, harassment, sexual misconduct, reporting obligations, supportive measures, and compliance with federal civil rights requirements. A total of 89 faculty and staff members participated.

During the week of September 29 through October 3, the university partnered with Citizens Against Domestic & Sexual Abuse (CADA), CASA Family Systems, and the Denmark Police Department to host its inaugural Red Zone Awareness Week. The initiative highlighted the increased risk of sexual assault during the period between the start of the fall semester and Thanksgiving break, commonly referred to as the "Red Zone." Programming focused on sexual assault prevention, bystander awareness, available support resources, and risk reduction strategies, with particular attention to the vulnerabilities faced by first-year students. More than 30 students and five faculty and staff members participated in the week's activities. As part of the initiative, the university also hosted a Domestic Violence Assembly to raise awareness of intimate partner violence and available resources.

October 2025

In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Voorhees University hosted an All-College Domestic Violence Awareness Assembly on October 2. The university welcomed survivor and guest speaker Yolanda Robinson, who shared her personal experiences and provided education on recognizing, responding to, and preventing domestic violence. The event reached 16 students and two faculty and staff members.

On October 3, representatives from CADA collaborated with Denmark Police Department officers to host the Stand Against Violence Sit-In in the campus dining hall.

The event encouraged dialogue on violence prevention, healthy relationships, and community responsibility in addressing domestic and sexual violence.

The university also partnered with CADA and Living Learning Community staff to launch Talk It Out Tuesday programming in residence halls. Beginning in Halimi Hall, the initiative provided students with opportunities to engage in conversations about dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, healthy relationships, and available support resources. The October session reached 26 students and four faculty and staff members.

November 2025

Voorhees University continued its prevention and awareness efforts by implementing the CADA/FYE Seminar initiative. Led by CADA Project Director Jamal DeWalt and supported by ACE Advisors, the program offered open dialogue sessions in residence halls on dating violence, stalking, sexual assault, and related prevention topics. The initiative aimed to increase student awareness of domestic and sexual violence, help students recognize warning signs of abuse, and promote prevention through culturally relevant education and outreach. The November session engaged 16 students and two faculty and staff members.

The event brought together more than 50 students, faculty and staff, and community participants for a day of education, engagement, and resource sharing.

The expo featured 10 community and state agency partners, including representatives from the South Carolina Department of Corrections Victim Information and Notification Everyday (SC VINE) Program, Orangeburg County Sheriff's Office, South Carolina Attorney General's Office Department of Crime Victim Compensation, CASA Family Systems, SCCADVASA, Tiger Plus, and Barnwell County Sheriff's Office. These organizations provided information on victim services, reporting options, prevention strategies, and available support resources.

A particularly impactful component of the event was a survivor testimony from an individual who shared their experience with domestic violence. The presentation reinforced the importance of prevention, education, survivor support, and community engagement. The event reached more than 50 students, five faculty and staff members, and approximately 15 community participants, creating a meaningful opportunity for learning, awareness, and collaboration.

South Carolina Sexual Violence Prevention Grant Information

The South Carolina Institute on the Prevention of Sexual Violence on College Campuses (SCIP) is now accepting applications for the 2025-2026 South Carolina Sexual Violence Prevention Grant. SCIP aims to play a critical role in coordinating and advancing the strategic development and implementation of best-practice standards across South Carolina higher education campuses to prevent interpersonal violence. An effective prevention strategy must go beyond a one-time event or program. Thus, the South Carolina Sexual Violence Prevention Grant is intended to serve as a supplemental funding source to support a more comprehensive prevention plan designed by the grant recipient.

The purpose of the South Carolina Sexual Violence Prevention Grant is to promote innovative initiatives and best practices that educate and build awareness around complex issues of sexual harassment, including sexual assault, dating or domestic violence, gender-based harassment or bullying, and stalking. Grant recipients will receive up to \$3,500, which must be used by May 15, 2026. Funding can support multiple programs or events.

Grant applicants should demonstrate how the institution will use the funds to support at least one of the following initiatives.

- Develop targeted prevention strategies to broaden awareness of rape culture and reduce the incidence of sexual harassment, including sexual assault, dating or domestic violence, gender-based harassment or bullying, and stalking on campus.
- Develop a program or series dedicated to healthy relationships.
- Create a safer campus by participating in bystander intervention programming focused on sexual assault prevention and high-risk behaviors.
- Establish a peer educator program that promotes a safe, healthy campus free from sexual violence. Peer educators may address consent, rape myths, risk factors, and/or social norms.
- Create a sexual assault resource fair in collaboration with campus and community members.
- Develop a research project related to interpersonal violence, sexual aggression, consent, or other areas tied to sexual harassment and assault.

- Develop a campus climate survey to better understand the scope of community issues related to sexual violence.
