Welcome

Chair Seckinger called the meeting to order at 10:09 a.m. Ms. Nixon confirmed the meeting was being held in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act.

Reorder the agenda.

1. Minutes of May 15, 2018

Chair Seckinger requested a motion to accept the minutes of May 15, 2018, as distributed. The motion was <u>moved</u> (Commissioner Jones) and <u>seconded</u> (Commissioner Munns) and the Committee <u>voted</u> <u>unanimously to approve the minutes as presented.</u>

4. Annual Report on Staff-Approved Mission Statement Modifications, FY 2017-18 (For information, no action required)

Chair Seckinger introduced the item for information only. Dr. Lane explained, per policy, Commission staff approved two non-substantive mission statement changes during FY 2017-18.

3. New EIA Centers of Excellence Competitive Grant Award, FY 2018-19

Chair Seckinger introduced the item, and the Committee <u>moved</u> (Munns) and <u>seconded</u> (Jones) a motion to accept the staff's recommendation for approval. Committee members asked about the logistics to implement the proposed center and whether the proposed center would adversely affect South Carolina State University's (SC State's) Program for the Recruitment & Retention of Minority Teachers (PRRMT). Dr. Jones explained it will take time for each partner in the proposed center to settle into their roles and pointed Committee members to the systems diagram within the proposal. Dr. Jones and Dr. Lane clarified the proposed center and PRRMT are funded from different sources and would not operate at crosspurposes. Commissioner Munns enquired about the types of activities that would engage high school student participants with the proposed center. Dr. Jones replied that students will be included in the development of the proposed center to foster engagement and the proposed center will make sure high school students have mentors within and outside their school to assist with engagement. Commissioner Munns recommended the proposed Clemson University center look to partner with PRRMT and add a paragraph about that partnership to their annual report.

Upon concluding deliberation, the Committee <u>voted unanimously to commend</u> favorably to the Commission the *EIA Centers of Excellence* Competitive Grant Award for FY 2018-19.

2. CERRA FY 2019-20 Appropriation Request and FY 2017-2018 Annual Report

Chair Seckinger introduced the item, and the Committee <u>moved</u> (Seckinger) and <u>seconded</u> (Munns) a motion to accept the staff's recommendation for approval. Ms. Turner made comments about the South Carolina teacher shortage and presented the Center for Recruitment, Retention, & Advancement's (CERRA's) FY 2017-2018 annual report. She gave an overview of CERRA's three recruitment programs (PRO TEAM, Teacher Cadet, and Teaching Fellows), their retention effort, and last year's supply and demand report. Committee members asked when the current supply and demand report will be available and what the Commission can do to help CERRA. Ms. Turner stated the updated supply and demand report will be available January 2019, as the school districts had not yet reported their vacancies to CERRA. She continued the Commission can continue to assist with collections on accounts for teaching fellows who did not get the loan forgiveness through service. Ms. Turner explained the increase in CERRA's FY 2019-2020 appropriations request (\$1,000,000) is to cover increased indirect costs from CERRA's host Winthrop University and pay increases for CERRA staff. Committee members requested CERRA add an itemized budget as an addendum to the appropriation request prior to the September CHE meeting

Upon concluding deliberation, the Committee <u>voted unanimously to commend favorably</u> to the Commission the CERRA FY 2019-20 appropriation request and the FY 2017-2018 annual report.

5. The Teacher Shortage and Educator Preparation

Chair Seckinger introduced the item and Committee members heard from educator preparation program deans and directors, the Education Oversight Committee, CERRA, the South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE), Mr. Patrick Kelly of Blythewood High School, Greenville Technical College, and Commission staff. Constituents expressed a need for longitudinal data on traditional and alternative certification educator preparation programs, high quality clinical experiences funded by the state, incentives for and deterrents to teacher retention, expanded options for alternatively certifying teachers, and barriers to educator preparation. As an example of retention initiatives, Dr. Whirl cited a housing finance incentive program currently available for qualified teachers in Greenville County. Participants discussed barriers to enrolling education majors, specifically Praxis Core scoring and the costs for retaking it. Representatives from SCDE cited changes to Praxis scoring thresholds the State Board of Education implemented in 2017, and that the State Board had the authority to enact further changes including composite scoring, therefore not requiring legislative action. Discussion continued about the merits of no Praxis exam requirements, composite scoring from multiple attempts, and requirements remaining as currently prescribed. Ms. Hipp enquired about academic certificate programs as a path toward teacher preparation, and Dr. Lane confirmed the Commission does consider academic certificates programs (e.g., post-baccalaureate). Dr. Jones stressed the importance of context and strategic advocacy in educator preparation requirements, citing demographics that could better benefit aspiring teachers if sound improvements are successfully implemented. Participants also discussed the financial burdens on the teaching profession, including college debt, lower salaries, out-of-pocket teaching supplies, and now the growing expectancy of working a part-time job during the school year. Upon remaining discussing, the Committee moved (Munns) and seconded (Seckinger) a motion for Commission staff to prepare a motion to declare the teacher shortage a Commission initiative, have the Commission conduct semi-annual stakeholder working group meetings, and have the Commission and other stakeholders write a cosponsored letter to the South Carolina General Assembly to highlight the teacher shortage. The Committee **voted** unanimously.
