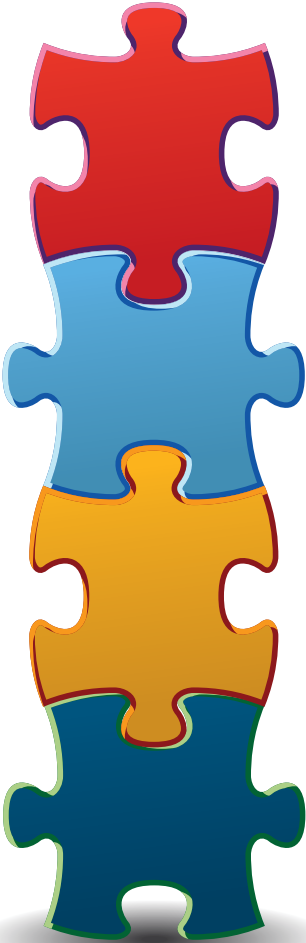

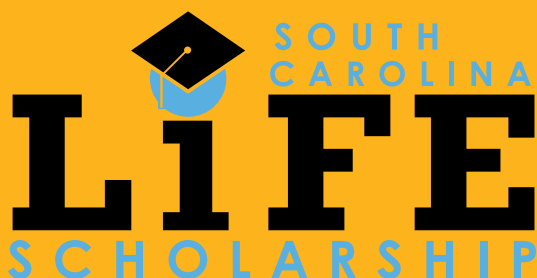
Initial Eligibility Criteria

Graduate from high school with at least a cumulative 3.0 GPA based on the SC Uniform Grading Policy.

Not be a recipient of the LIFE, Palmetto Fellows or Lottery Tuition Assistance awards.

Be a SC resident and US citizen/legal permanent resident at the time of high school graduation and college enrollment; and

Enroll as a full time degree seeking student at an eligible four year institution in South Carolina.



Initial Eligibility at four-year institutions

Students must meet two of the following three criteria:

Graduate from high school with at least a cumulative 3.0 GPA based on the SC Uniform Grading Policy.

Rank* in the top 30 percent of the graduating class based on the uniform grading policy.

Score at least 1100 on the SAT (or 22 on the ACT) by June of the senior year. Only the evidenced based math and evidenced based reading scores of the SAT may be included.

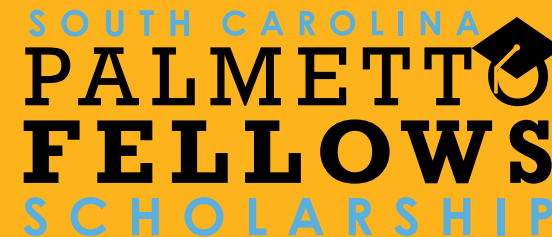
Initial Eligibility at two-year institutions

Graduate from high school with at least a cumulative 3.0 GPA based on the SC Uniform Grading Policy.

Be a SC resident and US citizen/legal permanent resident at the time of high school graduation and college enrollment; and

Not be recipients of the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship, SC HOPE Scholarship or Lottery Tuition Assistance.

Eligibility

Students meet one of the following criteria:

Earn a cumulative 3.5 GPA (based on the SC UGP)

Rank* in the top 6% at the end of the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade academic year Earn a 1200 on the SAT or 25 on the ACT

OR

Earn a cumulative 4.0 GPA

Earn a 1400 on the SAT or 31 on the ACT.

To qualify, a student must begin full-time enrollment as a degree-seeking student at an eligible South Carolina two- or four-year public or private college or university in the fall term directly after high school graduation, unless approved to take a Gap Year/Term.

Please work with your guidance counselor/home school representative to review your eligibility. A student must attend an eligible 4-year SC institution the fall semester following high school graduation.

**Rank is based on the policy in place at the high school/home school association. The student will need to be in compliance with their school's rank policy.*

SC Need-based Grant

The purpose of the S.C. Need-based grant is to provide additional financial aid to

South Carolina's neediest students. A student must enroll full-time or part-time as a degree-seeking student at an eligible SC public institution. To apply, students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The financial aid office at each eligible SC public college administers the SC Need-based Grant, as well as determines the students' eligibility.

Lottery Tuition Assistance Program

The Lottery Tuition Assistance Program (LTAP) is available to those students on a first come, first served basis who attend an eligible SC 2-year institution. LTAP goes directly to the cost of tuition. A student needs to complete a FAFSA application for eligibility. The student should contact the institutional financial aid office for questions of any additional steps that are necessary to be considered for LTAP.

Am I going to be one of the only students depending on financial aid?

The truth is that more than half of current college students rely on at least some form of financial aid, whether it's a savings plan, scholarship, grant, loan or work-study program.

WHAT'S THE SECRET TO A GREAT COLLEGE ESSAY?

There's no magic formula for writing exactly what an admissions officer wants to see, but your best bet is always to be yourself. Let your essay be a unique reflection of your personality, your interests and your perspective on something you're passionate about.



FOCUS, FOCUS, FOCUS

Remember that those reading your essay want to hear about you, so keep your focus clear throughout your draft.

BE ORIGINAL

Avoid cliché language that sounds like anyone could write it. Keep your statements personal, accessible and informative.

SURPRISE THEM

Use your essay as an opportunity to communicate something about yourself that your application can't say. Don't talk about things the reader will already know from reviewing your application.

BE YOURSELF

Write the way you normally speak. That doesn't mean using slang or casual language, but it also doesn't mean using lofty, unrealistic words when everyday ones will do.

TAKE YOUR TIME

Start early enough so you don't have to rush. Give yourself plenty of time to do the best you can.

USE YOUR RESOURCES

Have your English teacher read your essay and listen carefully to their opinion and/or suggestions.

Remember:

Bring your essay(s) to your College Application Event.

Your college(s) of choice may require you to submit an admission essay or personal statement with your application. **Bring your essay(s) with you preloaded on a USB drive** so you can easily copy your essay into your online application. Make sure you also have a hard copy for backup.

These questions will help you get started when talking to your parents about paying for college.

- I've been thinking about how I'm going to pay for my college education. Is this something you've been preparing for?
- One of the pieces of information I need to submit in order to apply for financial aid is the FAFSA. It's easier to fill out if you have already filed your taxes. When do you think we will have our taxes completed?
- There are some scholarships and grants that have been created for students of specific socioeconomic status or ethnic backgrounds. Do you know if I may be eligible to apply for any of these? Do you know of any specific scholarships that I may be a good candidate for? Is it possible that your workplace, church, social, or alumni organizations sponsor any scholarships?

Most colleges require an application fee (averaging \$35-\$70) when you submit an online application. Applying to several colleges can be expensive for any student.

The introduction page to the application will inform you of the fee amount, if any. Unless you have a fee waiver from your school counselor, you need to be prepared to enter a credit/debit card number or mail a check once you complete your online application. If you think you may be eligible for an application fee waiver, contact your high school counselor.

Important: Fee Waivers are available to students that are unable to pay for college application fees. Make sure to apply as soon as possible.

WHAT IS INCLUDED IN A COLLEGE APPLICATION?

Official Transcript

Your transcript is the record of all the courses you have taken for high school credit, your grades, and credits earned. Other information that might be included on a transcript: GPA, class rank, standardized test scores, courses in progress. This is normally sent directly from your high school to the college.

Standardized Test Scores

SAT or ACT Scores

The Application Form

No matter what school or what application, these will be important components:

- Personal and Educational Data (i.e., name, address, phone number, e-mail, citizenship and residency information, high schools you have attended, college credits you have earned, parental information, senior year schedule, standardized test scores)
- Honors and Awards
- Extracurricular, Personal, and Volunteer Activities
- Employment, Internships, and Summer Activities (Some colleges allow you to submit a resume in addition to the activity section of their application.)
- Essays, both short answer and a longer personal essay
- Disciplinary information
- Application Fee (Many colleges will accept fee waivers which can be obtained from the guidance office.)
- Signature
- For certain majors, students might be required to audition or asked to submit a portfolio of artistic work.

Secondary School Report Form or Counselor Recommendation Form

This is not required by all colleges, but if it is required, the high school is responsible for submitting this form to the college. However, you will need to request that it be sent. It is important to know and follow your high school's procedures.

Mid-Year Report Form

This form is not required by all colleges, but if it is required, it will be submitted by your high school. However, you must request that it be sent. The purpose of the form is for the college to see your grades from the first term of your senior year.

Teacher Recommendation Form

This form is not required by all colleges, but if it is, the teacher is responsible for sending it. However, you are responsible for asking a teacher to complete it and giving that teacher all the necessary information. Look over this form and imagine what one of your teachers would say about you. Colleges are not only looking for teachers from courses where you have received an A, but from teachers who know you well and can talk about your work ethic, inquisitive nature, and motivation to learn.

College Application Day FAQs

Do all South Carolina institutions accept the same application?

Institutions at www.che.sc.gov/sccango that are highlighted are registered with CollegeNet (The Common Application). All other institutions will require you to fill out different applications.

Do I need to create a new CollegeNet college application account if I already have one?

If you have already created college application accounts or completed college applications, please bring your account information with them. You will not need to create a new account.

How do I submit an official transcript?

Most colleges and universities require applicants to submit their transcript, including their senior year schedule. This is normally sent directly from your high school counselor to the college.

How do I submit a teacher recommendation form?

A teacher recommendation form is not required by all colleges, but if you are submitting one and if the teacher agrees to write the letter, the teacher is responsible for sending it. However, you are responsible for asking a teacher to complete it and giving the teacher all the necessary information. It is the student's responsibility to make sure the form (and any other supporting materials) were sent to the college.

College Prerequisites



FOUR UNITS OF ENGLISH

At least two units must have strong grammar and composition components, at least one must be in English literature, and at least one must be in American literature. Completion of College Preparatory English I, II, III, and IV will meet these criteria.



FOUR UNITS OF MATHEMATICS

These include Algebra I (for which Applied Mathematics I and II may count together as a substitute, if a student successfully completes Algebra II), Algebra II, and Geometry. A fourth higher-level mathematics course should be selected from among Algebra III/Trigonometry, Precalculus, Calculus, Statistics, Discrete Mathematics, or a capstone mathematics course should be taken during the senior year.



THREE UNITS OF LABORATORY SCIENCE

Two units must be taken in two different fields of the physical or life sciences and selected from among Biology, Chemistry, or Physics. The third unit may be from the same field as one of the first two units (Biology, Chemistry, or Physics) or from any laboratory science for which Biology and/or Chemistry is a prerequisite. Courses in earth science, general physical science, or introductory or general environmental science for which Biology and/or Chemistry is not a prerequisite will not meet this requirement. It is strongly recommended that students take Physical Science (taught as a laboratory science) as a prerequisite to the three required units of laboratory science outlined in this section. It is also strongly recommended that students desiring to pursue careers in science, mathematics, engineering or technology take one course in all three fields.



TWO UNITS OF THE SAME FOREIGN LANGUAGE

College Prerequisites



THREE UNITS OF SOCIAL STUDIES

One unit of U.S. History is required; a half unit of Economics and a half unit in Government are strongly recommended.



ONE UNIT OF FINE ARTS

One unit in Appreciation of; History of or Performance in one of the fine arts.



ONE ELECTIVE

One unit must be taken as an elective. A college preparatory course in computer science (i.e., one involving significant programming content, not simply keyboarding) is strongly recommended for this elective. Other acceptable electives include college preparatory courses in English; fine arts; foreign languages; social sciences; humanities; laboratory science (excluding Earth Science, general Physical Science, general Environmental Science, or other introductory science courses for which Biology and/or Chemistry is not a prerequisite); or mathematics above the level of Algebra II.



ONE UNIT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION OR ROTC

NOTES

1. Each institution may make exceptions in admitting (a) students who do not meet all of the prerequisites, limited to those individual cases in which the failure to meet one or more prerequisites is due to circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the student; or, (b) students who have taken the Tech Prep (Applied Academics) courses rather than the required college preparatory curriculum described above and who meet all other institutional admissions criteria.
2. The College Preparatory Course Prerequisite Requirements are minimal requirements for four-year public college admission. Therefore, students should check early with colleges of their choice to plan to meet additional high school prerequisites that might be required for admission.

College Goal South Carolina is an annual event during the months of October through March which helps students and families complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is the single most important financial aid form you will complete as you apply to college. Also, the FAFSA can be a prerequisite for qualifying for private awards.

In addition to receiving professional financial aid assistance in completing the FAFSA at the College Goal South Carolina event, students are also provided information on state scholarship programs, as well as information about the state's two and four year higher education institutions.

Who participates in College Goal South Carolina?

College Goal South Carolina is open to all college-bound students regardless of age. Whether a traditional student right out of high school, or an adult who is returning or pursuing higher education for the first time, College Goal South Carolina will help you complete the FAFSA accurately and on time. Dependent students (those under 24) should bring a parent or legal guardian. Independent students (24 or over) will not require a parent's income information.

What if I'm not sure I'll attend college?

Many students are not sure if they will be attending right after high school. When you complete the FAFSA, you aren't obligated to attend college. However, by completing it, you ensure that you won't miss any deadlines, which is important in case you decide to apply to college later in the year.

What should I bring to College Goal South Carolina?

Checklist of items NEEDED from you and your parent(s)/guardian(s) in order to successfully complete and submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) during a College Goal South Carolina event*:

- ✓ Social Security Number
- ✓ Alien Registration Number (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- ✓ Most recent federal income tax returns, W-2s, and other records of money earned**
- ✓ Bank statements and records of investments (if applicable)
- ✓ Records of untaxed income (if applicable)
- ✓ Federal Student Aid PIN to sign electronically (if you do not already have one, visit www.pin.ed.gov)

**If you are not a dependent student, you do not need the listed items from your parent(s)/guardian(s).*

***You may be able to transfer your federal tax return information into your FAFSA using the IRS Data Retrieval Tool.*
